Supply List for Microwave Bowls – May Workshop

Purchase Indigo Junction Pattern: IJ1102

All Fabrics and Threads must be 100% cotton

- Fabric: 2 Fat Quarters and Binding Strip $2\frac{1}{4}$ " × 36" cut on bias, folded in half and pressed.
- Freezer Paper.
- Thread 100% cotton to match all 3 fabrics.
- Scissors large and small, Long fine pins, 12" ruler, pencil or washaway marker.
- Sewing machine.
- Batting: 100% cotton with cotton scrim is hard to find. I will bring enough for everyone! The Guild will cover the cost.

Before class, trace and cut out the full size medium bowl template onto freezer paper.

I have adapted the technique so that making this bowl is faster, easier and better looking. I am fairly sure there will be extra batting squares if you want to make more for gifts.


Show and Tell: Wonderful as always, keep up the great work ladies.



Mary Larkin brought her electric GO! Qube Mix & Match block cutter to the basting meeting in March to use for making comfort quilt kits. I, for one, had no idea what this state of the art cutter could do. There are 8 dies for various shapes. These different size squares, half square triangles and quarter square triangles can make up to 72 different 9" finished blocks (examples pictured above).

Mary cut the all the squares for my comfort quilt, in 2 different colors, in less than 5 minutes! We have another basting session coming up this month, so talk with Mary to see if her cutter will be available for your quilt project.

Quilt Shop Review

I just returned from visiting family on both coasts of Florida...and surprise, I managed to squeeze in a couple of quilt shop visits during my trip. The first was Rainbow's End located in Dunedin, just a few miles north of Clearwater. My mom first brought me here over 17 years ago and it still ranks up there among my very favorite shops. Their web site states that they are the largest complete quilt shop in the state of Florida, with over 20,000 bolts of high-quality, 100% cotton fabric with more than 700 books, numerous patterns and kits, and a wide selection of notions, trim, ribbon, and stencils. If you are anywhere nearby, DO NOT miss this shop!

While I was in the West Palm Beach area I stopped in at **Quilt a Bit**. This was a small shop but they are in the midst of a renovation to double their current size. This shop looked so 'Florida' to me with bright colors everywhere. There were lots of batiks, Kaffe Fassett, contemporary Robert Kaufman prints and so, so many Florida novelty fabrics. Kiti would go crazy – they must have had 20

April Speaker



At our April program meeting Janneken Smucker gave an informative and interactive presentation about Amish quilts. She works closely on the digital projects of the Quilt Alliance, a national non-profit dedicated to documenting, preserving, and sharing the stories of quilts and quiltmakers. She has served as a board member of the Quilt Alliance since 2005, and is its current president.

At the end of her talk, Janneken described the new Quilt Alliance video project entitled "Go Tell It!" which is designed to capture the stories of quilts. The formula for "Go Tell It!" is simple: **one person** talking about **one quilt** in front of **one camera** for **three minutes—another quilt story shared!** Anyone can do a "Go Tell It!" interview: quiltmakers, quilt appreciators, recipients of quilts, quilt collectors, curators or historians. The Quilt Alliance is saving quilt stories, three minutes at a time! Go to the website listed below and talk about <u>your</u> quilt.....

May Block of the Month


The May BOM was submitted by Judy Peters

This 'Easy Block' has no points or matching seams. Makes a bright kid's quilt.

Cut 1 center: $5 \frac{1}{2}$ " square from a <u>novelty print</u> (kid friendly)

Cut 6 logs: 3" x 5 ½" rectangles in all <u>different</u> bright colors

Sew one log on top and then another log to the bottom of the center square. Sew 2 logs together lengthwise and then attach to one side of center. Repeat for the other side.



Block should measure 10 ½" unfinished.

About 3 hours west of here, below Altoona, is a sweet little town called Bedford. On the main drag you can find Mary Koval's quilt store in a building from the 1830s. Mary is a quilter, appraiser, quilt dealer, collector and fabric designer. Her store has antique quilts for sale, and repros of 19th century fabric, many of which she has designed. Upstairs are nestled 5 bedrooms, 2 full bathrooms, a large sitting room and modern kitchen for a pleasurable quilt retreat. The sewing room is downstairs, best for 4-6 machines only; with cutting and ironing in the spacious hall. The sitting room is ideal for comfy hand work.

Marylou and I recently were on a retreat here and had a lovely time. We were in charge of our own breakfast and lunch, then walked to nearby local restaurants (no chains!) for dinner. The staff is very friendly skilled quilters. While we were there they were getting ready for Quilt Market in Houston.

This was a pleasant change-of-pace. Grab a few friends, and go visit Mary. It's about 15 miles from the Flight 93 Memorial in Shanksville. It's \$75 per night, sheets and towels included, full kitchen available, as are local yummy eateries.
