Eileen Frankil announced openings in a Quilt Retreat to be held at Cocalico Retreat House from August 23-26 sponsored by the Grist Mill Guild. The cost of this retreat is \$200 and reservations are being taken by Beth Dimler of that Guild. See Eileen for further information.

<u>Fabric Exchange</u>: Fabrics for the monthly Fabric Exchange were collected by Marylou Boryta and Linda Glass.

<u>Tea</u>: Thanks were extended to Betty Ann Dawson and Lil Evans for beginning the collection of fabric and materials for the Sewing Room Sale at the Tea next Spring.

Upcoming Quilt Display: Eileen Frankil thanked those who have offered to participate in the "Birds and Words" display of 2016 Challenge Quilts made. These will be on display at the John J. Audubon Museum from mid-September to mid-October. Eileen will ask the Museum to waive admittance fees for Loose Threads members during this display. The last day to give your quilt to Eileen for this display will be on August 1.

Quilt Trip: Jane Russell revealed that the Red Rose Quilter Guild is planning a bus trip to Paducah, KY from September 11-17, 2018 and has 6 available seats on the bus. Tickets for transportation, plus admittance to the Show and the American Quilt Museum are available for \$550. Meals are extra. See Jane for more details.

Speakers: Laurie Kelly confirmed that Nancy Bills will hold a Workshop on Memory Quilts on Tuesday, October 16 from 9:30 – 4:00pm. She will then present a lecture on the same topic to the Guild on Wednesday, October17. Show and Tell: A brief Show 'n Tell session was held and the meeting concluded at 11:00am.



Getting to Know You

Linda Glass

After having gone through some difficult situations these past several years, Linda is about to open a new chapter of her life, downsizing into a lovely new home in the Kimberton area. She was born into a large farm family of 9 children (5 girls, 4 boys) in Elk County, Pennsylvania, between Pittsburgh and Erie where she enjoyed taking turns riding "Joy," the family horse. She graduated from St. Mary's High School and went to work assembling reactors and condensers near her home town for two years. A fortunate babysitting job introduced her to the possibility of a career as an x-ray technician and she found her way to Harrisburg Hospital where she trained for two years to become a certified x-ray technician. After a brief vacation in California, Linda soon moved to the San Fernando Valley in southern California.

Shortly thereafter, a fellow named Greg stepped into her life and they were married in 1982. By this time, Linda had become a technical specialist for Cardiac Cath labs with Command Medical Company and was transferred to Pennsylvania in early 1983. Linda joined Loose Threads in the year 2000 and finds she enjoys piecing and old-fashioned traditional quilting the best. She has also turned out some nifty needlecraft items for our Tea sale table.

Always enjoying road trips and camping, she and Greg were the proud owners of a couple of Harleys on which they crisscrossed the USA. Sadly, Greg passed away after a serious illness three years ago so life for Linda has changed tremendously. She is currently in the process of cleaning out the house they lived in for 34 years and



looking forward to a move this Fall to a lovely new community called Kimberton Glen. In these past 3 years, her beautiful ginger-hued Standard Poodle "Gracie" has been a rock for her, however it was on an excursion to the local dog park where several other large dogs tangled with Linda, resulting in a broken left ankle (this had been preceded by a stress fracture in her right foot). Just getting back to good health, Linda took the Harley out to dust it off and right in front of her house, she bobbled and ended up with a broken knee! Her latest casualty was a cracked right foot but now she's doing much better and looking forward to continued good health.

Linda has truly enjoyed the vast opportunities to see and learn from the many projects and items that are shared by the generous Loose Threads people and, as she has endured these traumatic times the past few years, she is most grateful for the Loose Threads community who has been so outgoing with friendship and support. Sewing Tips

To make hand sewing easier you can wear a secretary's rubber finger on your index finger. This helps to pull your needle through the fabric.

Use a small yellow post-it note (size: 1 inch) when threading your sewing machine. Place the yellow post-it note behind the sewing needle. The paper makes it so much easier to see the eye of the needle.

Save your leftover unused bamboo skewers from those summer barbeques. They work perfectly as a stiletto.



What to Wear and When to Wear It

Are you sometimes in doubt as to what to wear or when to wear it? In spite of the fact that ideas about clothes change and that they differ in various localities, still there are rules of clothes etiquette, built more or less on common sense, which can be trusted.

It's a comparatively simple matter for the girl who lives in smaller localities or those city dwellers who can travel by automobile to dress suitably for social affairs. The problem is different for city women who must use street cars or subways. Their costumes take on a more conventional, semi-tailored look appropriate not only to the social event but to the crowded street through which they must pass.

For Business: For this a simple, inconspicuous dress with good lines is best. But don't make the mistake of trying to be mannish. Keep your feminine frills and see that they are always immaculately fresh. Crepe de chine in a dark color is excellent for business wear.

For Evening: Rules of good dress stipulate no hat with formal evening dress. Nowadays it is not necessary to wear formal evening attire to the theatre unless one is to be seated in a box or is included in a party where all will be dressed formally. At a dinner party in the city, whether it means dining and dancing in a hotel or an occasion in a private house, you will never feel out of place if you choose a black or neutral colored gown. In smaller towns, however, custom invites the gaiety of the pale evening shades.

For Tennis: The approved outfit is either a short, plaited, one-piece wash dress – usually white – or a full skirt and sweater.

For Golf: A wrap-around or plaited woolen skirt with sweater or jacket, or a sports suit of jersey, tweed or woven materials makes the favored type of golf costume. Bright colors are attractive and gay on a golf course.

For Traveling: One dresses to be comfortable and primarily inconspicuous. Any good-looking street dress and topcoat is permissible. A small hat is more convenient than a large one. A pullman robe of dark material to wear from one's berth to the dressing room is in better taste than a gay colored kimono.

On Shipboard: A heavy topcoat is a necessity on board ship. Two well-tailored, long-sleeved wool dresses are best for daytime wear. Bright colors in accessories are especially pleasing on the water. Two evening dresses are desirable for dinner wear; one of them should be formal.

For Tramping: There are suits consisting of knickerbockers, skirt and coat made purposely for cross-country tramping. With such a suit, the hat ought to be small. If your taste is more conservative, choose a sweater and sports skirt.

For Camping: Bloomer suits with mannish shirts or middies are best. These can be made of khaki, linen or tweed. The coat is often sleeveless. The inconspicuous costume indicates the seasoned camper. Comfortable shoes and a small felt hat with wool or heavy cotton stockings, complete the costume.
