## Getting to Know You

#### Barbara Kuterbach

In mid-year 2017, we were most happy to welcome Barbara back to Loose Threads after an absence of about 17 years when she moved to Juneau, Alaska. She had maintained her contact with our Guild during these years as an Associate member and occasionally would pop in at our meetings when she visited her local family. Barbara grew up with one brother in Pottstown "under a quilt frame" in a very busy quilting family. Both of her grandmothers lived with them and always had a quilt frame set up in their big double living room.

She graduated from Pottstown High in 1947 then took a secretarial position. After marriage to Joe they moved out to Linfield where her husband's family lived. Six children followed, one girl, 5 boys and she did lots of sewing for all. In addition, she made many, many baby quilts for family and friends. She has kept her mother's Singer cabinet model sewing machine and still has it in her sewing room in Alaska.

After her children were grown and moved into their own homes, Barbara was invited by one son to come to Juneau and babysit with a granddaughter as both parents worked. She considered moving there but her son thought it wise for her to experience the long, dark winters first before committing to a full move. Convinced that she could handle the weather, she moved there permanently and lived in their house only 2 ½ miles from the base of the Mendenhall Glacier. She mentions that the *first* 4<sup>th</sup> of July fireworks in the USA are set off from a barge in the Juneau channel at 2 seconds after midnight as it is <u>finally</u> dark enough!

Although they have a lot of rain from January to June, Barbara found Juneau very, very friendly and everyone says hello to everyone. She joined the Capitol City Quilters and made two blocks for a very large quilt which is displayed at the Capitol. She also worked on many beautiful quilts with a group from her church there. She loved it in Alaska and plans to return in two years for the high school graduation of the granddaughter that she helped care for in Juneau. She has 9 more grandchildren who have graduated from high schools and colleges all over the US.

Barbara's favorite quilt pattern is the Log Cabin and she has made many for charity. She admits to a fondness for the color purple and really enjoys sewing



with the whole spectrum of purple fabrics. She is also a knitter who has turned out dozens of knitted dish cloths through the years.

Barbara joined Loose Threads a number of years ago and in those early years her husband, Joe, an avid quilter also, brought his machine and attended meetings with her. After her move to AK, Barbara often extended an invitation to our members to let her know if they were planning to visit Juneau. Our president, Eileen Frankil, acted on this invitation a few years ago; they prearranged to meet at the dock when Eileen's cruise ship arrived and Barbara took her to a local quilt shop as well as to a salmon hatchery where they enjoyed watching the leaping salmon!

Barbara has now moved into a senior community called Walnut Woods in Boyertown. She loves being back in PA and seeing old friends as well as meeting new ones and we love having her back with us again.

#### Quiltstock 2018

In July, I had the amazing opportunity to attend Quiltstock 2018, a quilting retreat put on by Moda/Martingale. I usually attend Quilt Odyssey every summer with my college friend Janice but we thought we would try something different this year. What a great decision!

We flew into Dallas on Monday and headed to the lovely Magnolia Park Cities Hotel in downtown Dallas to check in. It was a balmy 110° outside but no worries...we would be indoors sewing all week!

The event was held in a huge ballroom space at the hotel. We each had our own sewing space with a Babylock machine. Ironing and cutting stations were set up around the room. Everything was ready for a great week!

The event kicked off with a welcome and introductions of our teachers for the week: Barbara Groves and Mary Jacobson of *Me and My Sister Designs*, Lisa Bongean of *Primitive Gatherings*, Carrie Nelson (formerly *of Miss Rosie's Quilt Co.*), and Kathy Schmitz of *Kathy Schmitz Studio*. We were each given an overflowing gift sack FULL of quilting goodies: thread, charm packs, rotary cutters, books, magazines, needles, patterns, gadgets, gizmos, you name it! It was like Christmas in July!

There were four classes in all. During class time, partitions divided the ballroom into four separate pods. My pod was called the Churndash Chicks! Each day, the teachers rotated from pod to pod so that we never had to move from our workstation. They came to us which was very convenient. We had classes in our pods as well as Open Sew times when they opened up the walls into one huge workspace. Every day there was a trunk show of the teacher's quilts and a Make It Take It demonstration.

Our days started promptly at 8:00. Breakfast was provided by the hotel and lunch was served buffet style for everyone. We ate together

## September Program

#### Working with Wool

#### **Bring:**

- scissors
- embroidery thread black plus assorted other colors if desired
- embroidery needles
- one piece of wool or flannel about 7 1/2" square (for background)
- glue (Elmer's or other fabric glue)

Everyone will be given a bird shape to practice the blanket stitch. There will be demos of hand and machine stitching. Bring your machine if you want to.

<u>Optional</u> - there will be patterns to trace for larger projects including a seasonal table topper that is a 13 x 21" oval.

You may want to bring additional wool to trace the pattern for this.

\* There will be wool from the sewing room sale for purchase as well.\*








#### Treasures from Eileen's Grandmother

One charming book among Eileen's grandmother's collection is a Rand McNally Activity Book, dating from 1928, called *The Make-It Book, Things to Do with Scissors and Paste and Odds and Ends* by Rachel Dixon and Marjorie Hartwell. It has some simply lovely drawings that add to its appeal.

The introduction states, "Through the use of the simplest and most inexpensive materials... and by following simple directions there emerge surprise beasties, trick toys and fantastic costumes. In the process, the child gains not only amusement, but sound educational values, as well."


There are directions for: folding paper, paper bag masks, hats, paper dolls, kites, doll house and furniture. In addition, are instructions to made things from corks, walnut shells, toothpicks, clothespins, vegetables (!) and candy.



Place half a walnut shell on cardboard and draw around it. Cut out the cardboard shape. Find a marble that is thicker through than the shell is deep, so that, when the marble is lying on the table, the shell placed over it is held just clear of the table. Cut a round hole in the cardboard, almost but not quite as large as the marble. Make this hole just as round and smooth edged as you can, so that the marble, when placed in it, turns around easily. For a tail, tie a string about 5 inches long through a hole in the large end of the cardboard. Glue the cardboard to the shell with the marble inside. Cut some mouse ears of paper and glue them to the shell. Mark the eyes and whiskers with a pencil. Place the mouse on a smooth surface that can be tilted a little this way and that, and he will slip about in a very realistic way.



#### CORK DUCKS

Materials: Corks, thin cardboard, wax crayons, knife, tacks

Funny little ducks, which will float when put in water, are made of corks. You will need, besides the corks, a bit of thin cardboard and some tacks.



Perhaps you will want one large duck and a flock of ducklings. Cut out the head and tail from cardboard, using the diagram as a guide. Mark the eye and color the bill orange with your crayons. With a knife, cut the edge of each end of the cork, as in the diagram, and insert the head and tail. Now push the tacks in on the under side of the cork to serve as the two feet. This will hold the duck right side up in the water, and if the tacks are put in carefully they will hold it erect on land as well.

You may wish to give the duck a coat of white paint when it is done. Of course you can make this floating bird as odd as you like by making a funny head and tail—perhaps you will use a tuft of little feathers for a tail. The shapes of your corks may suggest new ideas to try.

You will find that round, flat corks make better turtles than ducks. Use tacks for flippers, and a heavy brad for the tail, pushing it far in so that only a short end shows. This will weight the turtle, making him swim in a more natural position. The head is cut from cardboard, and pushed into a slit in the cork.

## October Workshop with Nancy Bills

Nancy Bills will be our guest speaker at our program meeting on October 17<sup>th</sup>. She will be doing a workshop using vintage hankies, lace and linens, especially designed for our guild, on Tuesday October 16<sup>th</sup>. She has sent the following information to help you decide which project to select. Sign up for the workshop with Rosemary Geisler.

#### NOTE: Photos of each project and the supply list are attached to this newsletter email.

"My first suggestion is a table runner made using any of the six basket/container patterns that come with my wall hanging pattern – I've included a photo of the cover to show the options. I'll supply that pattern with the class and they could do any of the six wall hanging versions at home, but we'd concentrate on a runner for class – that way it doesn't have to be quilted in class. The one shown is vintage Christmas using the basket that goes with that. You can see that I used a little lace on the one basket, but you could definitely add more lace, doilies, hankies, etc, or none at all. The border is done with a template that I have for sale and is totally optional, but I'll demo it. We could really have fun designing each runner. I'll have images printed and ready to use. They'll be for sale individually. The options are Vintage Christmas, Mid-century Christmas, Patriotic, Halloween, Easter, and Sewing (this is best done as a wall hanging, but the option is there). If people bring their own vintage pieces, we can try to work them into the runner. I would like a count of how many people are interested in purchasing the images and which ones they want so that I can be sure to have them for class. The runner shown uses 9 images. They are printed on cotton fabric, have Heat N Bond Lite on the back, and are trimmed and ready to sew on the quilt. I sell a set of 10 for \$8.

The second option is for anyone who has a lot of doilies, hankies, lace etc. I'll demo crazy piecing with vintage linens. It makes a great pillow, pillow sham, or whatever and is super fun. It does take quite a few linens. If someone is interested in doing that, they can bring their own or I'll have quite a few for sale very reasonably at the class. I have doilies, embroidered pieces, hankies and other stuff. The crazy piecing takes bits and pieces and is great for damaged pieces or leftovers. You could also do a crazy pieced background and work in a few vintage images printed on fabric. The photos show one in all neutrals and the other two are more colorful versions. The basket set on a large linen is done on wool and has machine embroidery on the basket. It's a pillow in the works. I will also have a limited number of individual images for sale, but again, it would help to know what people might be interested in. Individuals are \$1 each – it's cheaper if they purchase 10.

The crazy piecing doesn't have to be frilly looking. If anyone does machine or hand embroidery, that can also be worked into any of these pieces so they should bring along any odds and ends that they might have. There's no promise that we'll use everything that people bring, but we can definitely have fun swapping ideas.

I'll also do a small presentation of things that I've done with vintage pieces to give everyone ideas and will talk about printing on fabric and show other options of things to print such as recipe cards, etc."
