


President's Message

Alex and I went on a trip to see America's National Parks in September. We flew into Denver, CO and joined a bus tour going to Rapid City, South Dakota, the city of the presidents. There were statues of all of the presidents along many streets. It was so nice to stop and read the details on plaques for each of the Presidents. Next day we visited Crazy Horse Memorial and Mount Rushmore National Memorial. It was such a beautiful warm day, we just had to have an ice cream cone made with Thomas Jefferson's famous ice cream recipe.

We then headed towards Wyoming enjoying a drive through the Black Hills National Forest and a guided tour of Deadwood. Afterwards, we visited Tatanka to learn about the story of the Bison and the Lakota people - how their survival depended on using the Bison for food, clothing, utensils and making material for lodging.

The following day was southern Montana and a visit to Little Bighorn Battlefield National Monument. The museum was so informative and the history of the battle trail really gave you an idea how strategic the Lakota, Cheyenne and Arapaho warriors, led by Chief Sitting Bull, managed to defeat Custer and his military.

On to the Buffalo Bill Center of the West which had five areas of historic weapons, art and memorabilia from his *Rodeo and Wild West* shows. I wished we had a whole day to spend there.

We spent two days in Yellowstone National Park and it was awesome, so hard to even describe the beauty of this park. We visited the geothermal properties such as geysers, hot springs and mud pots. We viewed the Grand Canyon of Yellowstone, the Lower Falls and Mammouth Springs. It was so exciting to see Old Faithful in its glory. In fact, I managed to see it at least 5 times.

We traveled south into the breath-taking Grand Teton National Park and settled into the town of Jackson. That night we were treated to a horse-drawn covered wagon trip into Cache Creek Canyon and had a great Barbeque dinner and wild west show. Great fun. Our last day in Jackson Alex and I took a float trip down Snake river and enjoyed the scenery of the beautiful Tetons.

Finally, we journeyed south from Wyoming through beautiful mountain ranges into Utah. In Salt Lake City we took a tour of the capital city, historic monuments and the Mormon Tabernacle and Temple Square. We returned home with wonderful memories of our National Parks trip.

Fabric Exchange 2019

The Fabric Exchange for 2019 will begin very soon. We are featuring 2 ½" strips this year in both batiks and solids. If you are interested in collecting these strips for your quilting use, please sign up in November 2018 with Joanne Cantwell.

The 2019 Fabric Exchange will begin in <u>January</u> and will run <u>through September</u>, 2019. Each month you will cut 2 ½" strips of a pre-selected color for the month and place them in a zip-lock bag with your name on it and turn them in to **Virginia Gates**, **Toni Hughes or Joanne Cantwell**. At the following meeting you will receive a group of strips in that color that other Fabric Exchange members have chosen.

When the sign-up period ends on November 30, 2018 and we know how many are participating, you will be notified of the exact number of strips to cut monthly for the remainder of our quilting year 2019.

We will be selecting **batiks strips** in specific colors for the first part of the year, followed by **plain strips** in specific colors for the last part of the quilting year as follows:

MONTH	SIZE	FABRIC TYPE	COLOR
January 2019	2 ½" strips	batik	orange tones
February	2 ½" strips	batik	brown tones
March	2 ½" strips	batik	deep reds
April	2 ½" strips	batik	dark green tones
May	2 ½" strips	plain	orange tones
June	2 ½" strips	plain	brown/rust
July	2 ½" strips	plain	deep red
August	2 ½" strips	plain	dark green
September	2 ½" strips	plain	yellow

We will conclude the exchange at the end of September, 2019 so that the next team can be off and running a bit earlier than we are able to this year. If you have any questions, please contact Virginia Gates, Toni Hughes or Joanne Cantwell.
