This year's Tea, again, will feature a wide range of discussion topics: Working with Felted Wool, Redwork, the New England Museum, Better Bindings and Edges, Hexies and the 100 Day Project. At our March program we will hear two of these presentations.

Tea Quilt Show

One of the main attractions of the Quilter's Tea is our member quilt show. Here are this year's show rules and reminders:

- All sizes and shapes of quilts are welcome as long as they have never been shown at the Tea before.
- We're anxious to see your personal quilts but don't forget about those 'Guild Projects,' such as the BOM, Row by Row exchange, Cynthia England's and Nancy Bill's workshop projects and, of course, our *Beatles* Challenge.
- Each quilt must have a paper label (described below) attached with safety pins.
- The quilts must be delivered, first thing, to the 2nd floor Church Sanctuary on set-up day, Friday morning March 8th. NO QUILTS WILL BE ACCEPTED ON SATURDAY!
- Queen-size quilts must have a hanging sleeve on the back. If you don't want to sew it, then pin it on with safety pins.
- All the quilts will be numbered so the Tea guests can vote for Viewer's Choice. Reminder: ONLY GUESTS VOTE, NOT MEMBERS.

Specifications for typing and printing the

quilt label: Attached with this newsletter is a REVISED electronic MSWord .doc version of the quilt show label for guild members to use at the Tea show. Just type your info directly into the label and print out. It is also posted on our website.

<u>Label size:</u> 5" x 6" Pin with safety pins on the <u>front</u>, in the middle of the <u>RIGHT</u> side of the quilt.

If you don't have a computer or printer or are simply having trouble, give Linda Hamel your write-up and she will type and print it for you.

Getting to know you

Starved for some good quilting conversations, four years ago Nancy conceived an idea for developing an Evening Bee for Loose Threads members who work during the day or who want more "together" time for working on their projects. Meeting for 2-1/2 hours on the second Wednesday evening each month, Loose Threads Evening Bee enjoys regular attendance of approximately ten or so quilters per session. Thank you Nancy for that initiative!

Growing up in Westfield, New Jersey, Nancy recalls learning to sew in the 7th grade Home Economics class where she made her first skirt. She loved to sew and continued taking sewing through Jr. and Sr. High, then followed this eventually with a couple of tailoring classes. She earned a degree in Business Administration from Albright College in Reading, PA where she met her husband Kip. After marriage they moved to Douglasville, PA where she worked in retail and banking for a period until their children arrived. Kip and Nancy now reside in North Coventry and she became a stay-at-home Mom for 18 years with daughter Mandy, now a kindergarten teacher in Boyertown, son Eric, a nuclear physicist in Elizabethtown and daughter Betsy, a mechanical engineer in northern VA.

Many years ago, a friend invited her to attend a Loose Threads Tea and, upon hearing that there was a local quilt guild that offered <u>babysitting</u>, Nancy jumped at the chance to join the Guild. Here she met several of our current members from those early days: Bernie Hughes, Laurie Kelly and Debbie O'Keefe among others. In 1989 she attended a quilting class at the Summer House in Oley (now known as Ladyfingers). Here she made two quilt blocks per month and, at the end of a year, had enough blocks to make a quilt! Her one fiasco with quilting in those early days was her passion for making a Lone Star quilt. After repeated attempts, her quilt just was not coming together and it now resides in Quilter's Heaven!

Her most favorite aspect of quilting is enjoying the many *fabrics* available today – the colors and



patterns of so many and the shortcuts one learns along the way. She also finds watching the process of quiltmaking fascinating... from the bolt to the piece... many pieces... with the end result of one BIG piece! She also enjoys seeking out and visiting quilt shops as she travels. She is also now a member of the Quiltmakers of Boyertown, a guild that meets in the evening once a month.

Nancy eventually went to work as a Teachers Aide in the Owen J. Roberts district where she enjoys her current role in learning support and autistic support at West Vincent Elementary. She served as Treasurer for Loose Threads before she returned to work and now during her school breaks, she participates in the Loose Threads road trips and various other activities. She finds our Loose Threads members very talented, welcoming and supportive. When she's not sewing or quilting, she also enjoys reading but her primary interest is spending time with her family!

How to Care for Your Quillts

Caring for Quilts on Display

Rotate quilts on display often to give them a rest. This will diminish their exposure to dust, light, and other potential sources of fabric. A quilt that doesn't have an obvious top or bottom can be turned periodically to prevent distortion or damage to the fabrics along one end. You may wish to add a hanging sleeve to more than one edge to make rotating the quilt easier.

TIP: An unused bed makes an ideal storage spot for quilts. Spread your quilts on the bed, separating them with layers of cotton fabric, cotton sheets, or batting to prevent any dye transfer.

Clean and freshen a quilt using one of these methods

TIP: Evaluate <u>antique quilts</u> individually before attempting to clean them. Improper cleaning can damage a quilt. If a quilt has sentimental or monetary value, consult an expert before cleaning it.

Airing Outdoors

Take quilts outdoors once a year on an overcast, dry, and windy day to refresh them. Place towels or a mattress pad on the dry ground and lay your quilts on them. Cover the quilts with bedsheets to prevent debris from falling on them. Avoid placing quilts on a clothesline to prevent stress on the seams.

Using a Dryer

Quilts can be freshened in a dryer on a gentle-cycle/air-dry setting without heat.

Vacuuming

Vacuuming both the front and back of a quilt can help preserve it by removing dust and dirt. Place a nylon hose or net over the end of a vacuum hose and gently draw the hose over the quilt's surface without rubbing it. Always clean a quilt with at least a quick vacuuming to remove dust and dirt before storing it.

Washing

Many everyday quilts are made for heavy use and therefore require laundering. Take care to use a dye magnet, such as a Color Catcher sheet, in a washing machine on a gentle cycle to absorb any excess fabric dye. Avoid washing an antique or heirloom quilt unless it's absolutely necessary. Washing, even when done on a gentle cycle, causes fabrics to fade and is abrasive to fibers. As a last resort, cotton quilts can be washed in cold water with a gentle soap by hand or in the machine on a gentle cycle. Do not wring or twist a quilt; instead, gently squeeze out the water. Wet quilts are heavy and need to be supported when you are moving them to a flat area to dry.

Wings Challenge

Here's a few thoughts to help you get started on your challenge quilt.

The 120" maximum perimeter has lots of options.

- For instance, a wallhanging of four12 inch blocks still allows enough space to add generous borders if you want them.
- Or a quilt of 9 squares, three across and three down, still has room for a border.
- And 120" is plenty of space to create a table runner 40" long.

A medallion quilt could be a perfect design to highlight one beautiful butterfly surrounded by borders.

Don't forget that you can use fabric with birds, butterflies, and other motifs combined with a pattern of your choice.

Add embellishments if you choose. There are lots of buttons of ladybugs, butterflies, bees and bugs available. Be on the lookout for vendors if you head to the Lancaster quilt shows.

And finally, like the samples below, 'wings' can certainly fill the bill when it comes to choosing the quilting design for your project.


