Quilt Shop Review

Serendipity Quilt Shop 31821 Cannon Street Dagsboro, DE 19939

www.serendipityquiltshop.com

Located on the main street leading into Bethany Beach, Serendipity occupies a charming brick red Cape Cod style house with a wraparound porch. On my first visit, I spent 2 hours doing laps around the store admiring quilts, displays, and

fabric.





The store is jam packed with everything quilting and knitting/crocheting related but is organized in "departments" which makes shopping really nice.

They have a great felted wool area with lots of patterns and colors. Lots of batiks, traditional prints, Modas, juvenile prints, and seasonals. On my second visit, I stopped in on a Saturday morning. When I pulled up, the parking lot was packed – I had stumbled on one of their "First Saturday" breakfast meetings. Held once a month, these meetings are a fun way to introduce new products, eat a little breakfast, and of course SHOP.

I would recommend stopping at Serendipity the next time you are in "slower, lower Delaware". You won't be disappointed!





My Sewing Space

Anyone is welcome in my Sewing Studio; it is a place of creative expression and learning from mistakes. The only creatures that do not cross the threshold into my creative space are my two dogs. This is for their protection from the kitty that guards the space.

I am incredibly thankful for my creative space, for every tool, surface and inspiration that is stored in the four walls. There are antiques and new elements mixed together out of the need to just make things work. I have acquired items from my father's factory, my mother's childhood home, my husband's leftover wood scraps, thrift shops, antique shops and just gifts given with the phrase "I bet you could do something with this".

I have creative storage because my home was constructed in the 1700's. Most of the fabric I have is under my main work surface in plastic bins. I have a large dining room table in an adjacent room and additional storage that I can also use to spread my work out when needed. I tend to work on smaller sewing pieces. I have a small machine and my sewing is very average. I thrive on the design element, the color and the feel of fabric and textiles. The rules for sewing that most people follow are just guidelines for an artist. I push the limits, break needles, mix fibers, and sew against the grain, even put colors together that may seem odd. I am more of a creative quilter than pattern quilter, so my space is much more of a creative sewing studio than a sewing room.

My Sewing Space

My strongest art medium is photography; my degree is in photography from The Art Institute of Philadelphia. I followed up with art teaching courses at the University of the Arts for working with children with Autism. I do not have my teaching degree, but I have taught for Pottsgrove School District by teaching with Summer Scholar's and Project Purpose. My recent trip to Haiti with the opportunity to teach art to the women there was life changing. I am excited to see how that experience unfolds into new opportunities. For now I am a perpetual freelance artist.

If I could change anything about my space it would be to have my carpenter husband build some open cabinets and add more lighting. I feel like I never have enough light. In my dreams I would have a big space with lots of table space and a collaborative creative design team to work together on projects for Fair Trade for female Artist Worldwide.





So, why am I in a quilt guild? I have a friend who is an excellent quilter and about 25 years ago she taught me a little bit about them. When my son was born I was given a quilt at the NICU at CHOP and then again when he was a little older. It touched me and I wanted to be part of something like that... a quiet gift of love woven together with the tenderness only women can give.

Block of the Month: Silvia Homa, Silverrn6@gmail.com, Kathie Travis, KBTravis92@gmail.com, and Stephanie Adrian, photogal13@verizon.net, will be delighting us each month with ideas for a "Calendar Quilt" theme. Each month's block is to highlight 3 prominent colors. Finished Block size will be 12" X 12". A block suggestion will be provided but you can also use your own block design. If you've always wanted to try out a new block design, now is the time to do it.

November's colors are burgundy, burnt orange and gold. September's colors were red, yellow and blue. October's colors were cranberry, orange and green.

Round Robin: There are 3 different "Round Robin" projects. Two projects use a linear (horizontal strip) quilt format and will be used, as need arises for a guild member who could use the comfort of a quilt made by the guild. The third is a true Round Robin which is done with a medallion center surrounded by consecutive borders (you furnish the center square area, provide the fabric to be used and decide on the 'rules' for your individual quilt).

Member Recipes

Joanne Cantwell brought this delicious treat to the basting session in October. It's a keeper.

Apple Gingerbread with Lemon Sauce

Liquid Ingredients for Gingerbread:

1 large apple, peeled, cored and roughly chopped

1 cup molasses 1 cup milk

½ cup melted butter

1 egg

Dry ingredients:

2 cups flour

½ tsp. baking powder ½ cup brown sugar ½ tsp. ground cloves

2 tsp. ground ginger 1 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. baking soda

Spray baking pan with nonstick cooking spray. In a blender or food processor (I used an immersible hand blender), pulse the butter, molasses, egg, milk and apple until apple is pulp, about 15 sec. on high. Set aside while mixing together all dry ingredients in a large bowl. By hand, combine the liquid with the dry until just incorporated, it is fine if lumps are present. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in middle comes out clean. For larger pan, bake about 45 minutes.

Remove from oven to cool a few minutes before slicing to serve warm or refrigerate, covered, before serving cold. Good with Lemon Sauce or whipped cream.

Lemon Sauce for Gingerbread or Cake:

½ cup white sugar ½ tsp freshly grated nutmeg (dry ok)

1 tbsp. cornstarch 1 cup boiling water 1/8 tsp. salt 1 tsp. grated lemon zest

1 tbsp. butter 1 lemon, juiced

In saucepan, stir together sugar, cornstarch and nutmeg. Gradually stir in boiling water, then simmer over low heat until thick, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat, stir in butter, lemon zest and lemon juice and serve. (Makes an 8" square pan; for 9" x 13", I doubled the recipe and sauce).



Betty Ann Dawson recently made this pancake recipe, from Martha Stewart Living magazine, for company and got rave reviews. Try them out on your holiday visitors!

Gingerbread Pancakes

Whisk together: 3 cups flour 1 Tbsp baking powder

> ³/₄ tsp baking soda 1 tsp coarse salt

2 tsp ground ginger 2 tsp ground cinnamon

½ tsp ground cloves ½ tsp nutmeg

Add: 3 large eggs ½ cup molasses

3 cups buttermilk

Stir until combined. Cook on hot griddle. Serve with maple syrup and fresh whipped cream.

Polka Dot Baby Quilt

Toni Hughes, who along with Lil Evans ran the polka dot fabric exchange last time around, made an easy and adorable baby quilt with her 'dots.' She found the pattern on

<u>Pinwheels and Postage Stamps Baby Quilt</u> Measures approx. 32"x40"

Materials needed:

- Solid & patterned fabrics. FQ's of patterned fabrics should be plenty for this size if you use variety. For the solids, buy a yard or so.
- $\frac{1}{2}$ $\frac{3}{4}$ yard fabric for binding
- 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ yard fabric for backing



Step 1. Cut out squares

- For pinwheels you will cut out 5" squares of equal amounts of solid and patterns. You will need two squares of each patterned and solid fabric to complete one pinwheel. I used 12 different fabrics for the pinwheels. So, 2 of each equaling 24 squares and 24 solid squares.
- For postage stamp squares cut 2.5". I used 16 per row with 4 rows total.
- Cut sashing out of solid at 2"x44" for on top, sides and in between each row for a total of 8
- Cut 5-6 straight bias strips for binding at 2.25×44.

Step 2. Assemble blocks and rows.

- Your pinwheels should come out at 9" and then will measure 8.5" when sewn into the quilt top. Assemble 4 pinwheels together into a row. Press seams open when linking pinwheels together.
- Sew your postage stamp squares in groups of 4 and trim and then assemble group of 4 into a row. Do that to all rows until you have 4 rows total.
- Add sashing in between rows of pinwheels and 2 connected rows of postage stamp squares. Add side sashing along entire length on both sides of top.

Step 3. Quilt.
