Astronomical Challenge

While I was exploring Linda Glass's recommended website, I clicked on a link to some star blocks displayed at the recent Houston quilt show. After a bit of investigating I discovered a rather fascinating story about a fellow quilter.

International Space Station Expedition 37 Flight Engineer Karen Nyberg of NASA is a lifelong lover of sewing. As if being a mechanical engineer and astronaut isn't significant enough, the avid quilter brought sewing supplies, including fabric, scissors, thread and five needles, along on her mission, in order to create a quilt block while in space. While on board the ISS from May to November 2013 Karen was able to complete a star-themed quilt block during her limited free time.

This feat was not without its challenges. Addressing the difficulty of quilting in weightlessness in a video released NASA, Karen said, "Now that I've tried my hand sewing in space, I can say one thing with certainty: It's tricky."

At the close of the video, she invited fellow crafters to join her in stitching together a global community space quilt. To help celebrate both her mission and her passion for the quilting arts, Karen hoped that quilters would make 9 ½ inch, signed star blocks and send them to the 40th anniversary of the International Quilt Festival which was held in Houston this past fall of 2014. The response was truly overwhelming...over 2,200 star blocks were displayed as part of a special exhibit by NASA's Johnson Space Center.

Board Decisions

The board met to clarify the issue of paying the <u>non-refundable</u> deposits for retreats, bus trips, or other occasions. Any planned event which requires a non-refundable deposit will be the responsibility of those involved.

Also, the board is making the following suggestion, which will be voted on by the membership at the next meeting. Since we have begun to ask members to contribute \$5 each toward food for the Tea (rather than each be responsible for making the food), it was suggested that we raise the membership fee by \$5 to include this expense. That would relieve the Tea chairperson of having to collect the money as an additional responsibility.

Loose Threads Round Robin for 2015

Reminder: If you signed up for the Round Robin organized by Clem Dupont...the holiday rush is over, the New Year is here and it's now time to begin! Here's what you need to do in the next week: Complete and square up (!) your medallion center. There are going to be a number of concentric borders added around the starting medallion so make sure it is correct to begin with. Gather up all the coordinating fabrics that you would like participants to use and write a short note of your 'rules' and preferences for your project. Put everything in a secure bag or plastic box and bring it to the February guild meeting. All the participants will get together after the meeting and decide on the time frame for the exchanges. Haven't signed up, but all this sounds like a whole lot of fun, then contact Clem and join in!

Round Robin Information taken from the Quilters Club of America website:

<u>Brief Definition of Round Robin</u>: It's a quilt that is made by a group of quilters. To start everyone makes a center block, then it's given to the next quilter for the 1st border. After the border is completed it's given to the next quilter for a 2nd border and so on. After the 4th border the center/quilt is sent back to you, the original owner.

Guidelines:

- COMMITMENT: when you sign up you are committed to meeting the deadlines and finishing the project. The whole group is depending on you
- Work on another quilter's project as you want her to work on yours.
- Measure, measure! Make sure your measurements are accurate, cut straight and use 1/4 inch seams. Make sure your addition and finished project is square!
- Always follow the requests of the owner of the center block. Remember, this is their quilt, not yours.
- Do not change previous work! Pretty clear.
- If you are having difficulty deciding what to do: leave the center on the wall for a few days and let it "talk to you." If this doesn't work, ask for help!
- RELAX and HAVE FUN! (Yes, it is possible, even with rules and guidelines).

The FLOWER fabric exchange for February is red /roses.

$Swee the art\ Star\ \ {\tt Designed\ by\ Kathie\ Travis\ @2015}$

5" x WOF Solid red or pink for hearts

5" x WOF Mini-patterned red or pink for star


Cut (1) square 5" x 5"


5" x WOF White for background

Make (4) Paper-pieced sections.

Set the first section to the center square utilizing a partial seam. Add the other 3 sections. Finish the partial seam

Raw size should be 12 ½"
