2016 Challenge

This year, 2016, the challenge is:

Birds and Words

You will be creating a finished quilt that must contain two elements on the front of the quilt. It must contain at least one bird AND at least one word. The word(s) may be in English or any other language. And think of all the different birds you might depict. There are 10,000 different kinds of birds! (Owls, penguins, chickens, eagles, turkeys, ostriches, songbirds, etc.) Do not just use a block with a bird-like name like "flying geese". It should be recognizable to the public as a bird.

The quilt should be a wall hanging size. The maximum perimeter should be 160 inches. But it may be smaller if you like. It may be any shape, but please keep it within the maximum size. Clothing or other quilted items (such as handbags or pillows) are welcome too.

You may use any technique to place birds and words onto your quilt. A quick search on Pinterest will provide much inspiration. For example:

Paper-pieced
Applique
Reverse applique
Machine-quilted shapes
Computer printing onto fabric or iron-on transfer sheets
Writing/ drawing with fabric pens
Stamping on fabric
Stencils

Commercially available fabric with birds/ words/ letters.

Found items attached to your quilt (charms, scrabble tiles, etc.)

Challenge quilts are due to be finished and displayed at the holiday brunch in December 2016. Please work on your challenge in secret. Do not show

Couching novelty threads, yarns, or stitching bias strips onto your fabric.

Throughout the year the committee will plan some helpful articles in the newsletter that provide details and resources on some of these techniques you might like to try. If you have any questions, or if any of you have a favorite way of putting words or images onto quilts that you might like to share, please contact the committee.

Minutes – January Meeting

Betty Ann Dawson called the meeting to order at 10:00 A.M.

Items of Note:

• Pat Leiter has tickets for the raffle quilt. They will be available now through the TEA. Tickets for the raffle quilt are \$2.00 a piece or 3 for \$5.00. The proceeds will be donated to the American Prophyria Foundation.

<u>Business Meeting Raffle</u>: The raffle was won by Judy Snook.

<u>Basting</u>: The next basting session will be in March. The longer needles have arrived.

Block of the Month: The next section uses a Log Cabin design which is 8 inches square. Directions are on line.

Challenge: The 2016 challenge is "Birds and Words". The quilt must contain at least one bird and one word. The quilt can be any shape and can use any technique. It should measure no more than 160 inches around the outside edge. Remember not to show your challenge design to anyone in the guild until the finish date at the Holiday Brunch in Dec. More information is in the Newsletter.

<u>Charity</u>: There are a few quilt kits available. Check your stash and do your thing. We are a nonprofit organization so we are obligated. We contribute to St. Mary's Shelter, Manatawny Manor, Phoenixville Senior Center, and walker bags go to the Southeast Veterans. Does anybody know of any other charities to which we could donate?

<u>Field Trip</u>: The trip to the Lancaster Quilt Show is on Thursday, March 17. The cost will be about \$35 - \$37 for the bus trip and the show. Some other possible field trips are Marathon Thread in Conshohocken and Round Bobbin Quilt Shop in Ambler.

<u>Historian</u>: Linda Hamel is looking for Tea Block patterns of the past. Does anyone have Newsletters from the past that contain block patterns? She will be looking for volunteers to make quilt block for this year's TEA.

<u>Library</u>: There are two new books for the library: <u>Heritage Quilts</u> and <u>Wool Applique</u>. Don't forget to check out the novels that are a part of the Guild Library.

<u>Newsletter</u>: Linda Hamel asks that we send her anything that might be of interest to the members.

Program: There are some members who still need to turn in their bingo squares to Judy Snook. Also many are missing the novelty and holiday squares. In the February meeting we will get the bingo squares back to make into a block.

Retreat: The Camp Innabah Retreat in Pughtown scheduled for Feb 8 - 10 has been cancelled because there are not enough people signed up to go.

Secret Pal: If for some reason you don't bring your gift in for the Business Meeting, you should bring it to the next meeting.

Speakers: The speaker for April is Beth Nemesh. She does very intricate machine quilting and edge finishes. Her presentation will be about edging designs. Gyleen Fitzgerald will be a speaker for September 2017.

<u>Sunshine</u>: Kathy Travis said that Edy Martin is feeling overwhelmed with her medical problems. She suggested that members send her a cheerful "hang in there" note. Edy is staying with Kathy. Betty Dawson called Linda Glass and left her a message saying that we are thinking of her.

Fabric pieces can be donated to the Sewing Room Sale but they must be labeled with the measurement. Turn in to Debby O'Keefe.

<u>Membership</u>: There is a waiting list of two people.

Other items:

- There will be a mini lesson on the topic of rulers on Feb 3. Susan Glaser would like members to submit ideas for topics they would like to see covered in the mini lessons.

- The AccuCutter will be at the Church for the Wednesday Sew Night.
- The meeting ended with Show and Tell during which a variety of interesting, well-made items were displayed.

February Program

The next scheduled guild program is very appropriate for mid-winter with all that 'white stuff' piled up around us. Diane Hess will be showing us how to make a **Woven Snowflake Ornament** at the February program meeting. We won't need shovels for these snowflakes but check the list below to see what you do need to bring.

Supply List

Materials needed for each person:

- 1 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " piece of white card stock paper (I bought my card stock at Staples in an 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11 pack, then cut to size)
- 2 6 ½" x 6 ½" pieces of fusible (Wonder Under or Steam-A-Seam 2)
- 2 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " pieces of fabric, coordinating colors
- 1 6"- 8" length of string or thin ribbon to hang ornament

<u>Tools needed</u>: (These tools can be shared with a friend, not everyone needs their own, so buddy up!) iron & ironing mat

6"x 6" ruler (or a ruler that can cut at least 6" length)

Rotary cutter (with a sharp blade!)

Cutting mat (that can cut at least 6 1/2" length)

Hot glue gun & glue sticks (2 or 3 ought to do!)

Notes:

• I first bought a pattern & kit for the 'Woven Snowflake Ornaments' at Keepsake Quilting. They still sell the pattern & kit. Here is a link:

- The original pattern designer is Penny Marble Quilt Designs. (www.pennymarblequilts.com)

String Block Comfort Quilt Workshop

If you have blocks you want to turn in, please give to Debby O'Keefe.



 $4 - 1 \frac{1}{2}$ " x 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ "


 $4-1\frac{1}{2}$ " x $2\frac{1}{2}$ "


 $1 - 2 \frac{1}{2}$ " x 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ "

Getting to know you

Mary Larkin

Welcome to Mary Larkin, one of our newest Loose Threads members! Mary is a member of the Valley Forge Guild and heard about our daytime guild meetings which really appealed to her. Friends Rosemary Geisler and Judy Snook urged her to come along to a meeting and she was hooked! Mary is enjoying the size of our guild and the friendly people who are most welcoming. As a LT member less than one year, Mary looks forward to receiving our newsy newsletters, loves our road trips, and will be helping with our Tea for the second year.

Born and spending most of her childhood in Conshohocken, Mary moved to Norristown. Her first job was at the PA State Employment Office, thus giving her the opportunity to find her way to a job at General Electric in King of Prussia where she enjoyed working on publications and proposals. Marriage and children (3 boys) followed and she worked part-time for a period in ER hospital admissions for Sacred Heart Hospital where she gained a lot of respect for nursing and the medical profession. Since Mary had not sewn since her children were small, she decided to join the American Sewing Guild of Philadelphia to learn some new methods for sewing. Here she met a few women who wanted to help her with making these gowns.



She also helped with Breast Cancer sewing endeavors and has worked with the Girl Scouts sewing projects assisting with cutting and sewing. Always interested in learning quilting, she heard about the Valley Forge Guild and has been a member there for six years.

Travel is also high on Mary's list of interests... her best trip ever was a Ski Club trip to Europe where she skied over the Austrian mountains into Switzerland. She has also enjoyed cruises and the countries she has explored are England, Norway, Italy and Spain among others. A Pennsylvania cottage at Lake Wallenpaupack also has been a special place in her heart for 18 years. Mary loves the beach and ocean and her dream was realized when she purchased a condo in Ocean City, MD. Seeing the grandchildren playing in the sand and jumping the waves is a true blessing and of course, treating them to the Boardwalk rides and goodies became a tradition for the summer.
