- Toy stuffing or leftover quilt batting.

If you're cleaning out your fabric stash as part of a sewing-room reorganization for the new year and looking for a good place to send excess fabric, I've got help for you. Or for anyone who wants to give fabric to a good cause, I've created an updated list of places to donate fabric. There are some great causes that can always use fabric donations.

**Important:** Before you send off fabric willy-nilly, I do recommend contacting the organization directly before you donate to understand their specific needs and only send fabric they can put to good use.

**The Forget Me Not Project** is doing good at home and abroad. Renee teaches women in her local prison in Mississippi how to sew and these women make items to be sent to children in Uganda. You can contact Renee at forgetmenotprojectusa@gmail.com for more information.

**One Common Thread quilts** employs women in Honduras who handmake hexagon quilts to support their families and bring them out of poverty.

**19 Quilts for Natalie** is an organization that provides quilts for cancer patients and grieving parents dealing with the loss of a child.

Annie's Star Quilt Guild in Chico, California is collecting fabric and sewing donations for those who lost everything in the recent Camp Fire in Northern California.

Sew Blessed Kentuckian makes clothing to donate to children in third world countries.

**Serving with Smiles** is a Humanitarian organization in Utah that empowers kids to help serve. They can always use fabric and batting donations for blankets, bags, and quilts.

# New Quilt Shop in Phoenixville

Seamless Sewing Arts is located at 313 Bridge Street in Phoenixville. It opened in October 2020. The focus of the shop is contemporary fabrics with a modern flair. The owner, Denise Martin, believes that people need creative outlets and wanted to provide supplies, inspiration, and support life-long learning.

The shop offers classes in sewing, quilting, color & design, and individual use of the Handi-Quilter Avanti 8-foot long-arm (after training), as well as long arm quilting services.

Parking is available on the street, as well as in parking lot 5 (free before 5 p.m.), or metered in parking lot 4. It is on the same side of the street as the Colonial Theater.

Denise and her husband lived in California for 40 years working and raising their family. Denise was an art teacher in high school, and also was a fund-raiser for a non-profit. Her grandmother was a seamstress, and Denise used to make her own clothes. She learned to quilt from her mother-in-law about 25 years ago. After retirement they moved to the East Coast to be closer to family. They decided on this area due to the rich history of the country and access to major airports. Their son attended Parson's School of Design and works as a stylist for the Council of Fashion Design. Their daughter has recently been bitten by the sewing bug and is now making tote bags, doing cross-stitch, and teaching in a school.

I've shopped in the store twice since it has opened and found Denise very helpful. The colors are bright and cheerful, lots of Moda solids. Check out their web

Have any UFOs? Here is an opportunity to tackle that stash that is staring at you! Whether you attend our meeting in person or not, we welcome you to participate in this fun activity.

**If you plan to attend our February meeting**, please bring at least one UFO that you plan to finish by our meeting on Wednesday, March 17. You may describe pertinent details about your project. We will list all the projects and compare the results at the March 17 meeting.

### Josie Sharp

Just to get you ready to join in to the UFO program, here are 6 helpful steps to finishing your quilt UFOs from <u>NewQuilters.com</u>:

1. The first essential in finishing your UFOs is feeling a genuine urgency to get them done. Be honest with yourself about this. Maybe designing, piecing, or appliqué are the things you really love about quilting. Maybe, deep down inside, the basting, quilting, and binding don't interest you all that much. If that's the case, it might make more sense to find someone else who really loves finishing quilts.

2. Set manageable goals: Choose 1 or 2 projects to finish first. You'll reduce your pile of UFOs much faster if you break down the project of finishing them into a series of achievable goals. Don't try to confront the whole mountain at once; that's a recipe for discouragement.

3. Work 15 minutes at a time. Give yourself permission to take baby steps towards getting your quilt done. Even 15 minutes a day will get you there much faster than standing still!

- 4. Say NO to new projects. Commit yourself to finishing at least one UFO before you start any new quilting projects. If you're a hopeless project starter and find that goal too ambitious, you can set a goal of finishing one UFO from your pile for each new project you start.
- 5. Get support from other quilters. Here's where the February program can help!
- 6. Celebrate every quilt you complete!
