#### Items of Note:

  or \$5.00 for three.
- Mary Larkin won the 'Field trip prize' (Byer's Choice jigsaw puzzle) as her birthday was the closest to Christmas.
- Christmas gifts for the Church were donated on Wednesday. Our gifts were very much appreciated.

<u>Business Meeting Raffle</u>: The raffle was won by Jane Russell.

**<u>Basting</u>**: There is no basting this month. The next basting sessions will be at the end of March and June.

**Block of the Month**: The next block is the most complicated of blocks so far.

<u>Challenge</u>: The next challenge will be announced in the business meeting in January.

<u>Charity</u>: 20 quilts and 20 books are going to St. Mary's Shelter in Phoenixville. 9 large wheelchair bags went to the veterans. Kits are available for kids and adults.

**Fabric Exchange**: January will be animal prints.

**Field Trip**: Lancaster Quilt Show will be held March 16-19. The Guild bus trip will be on Thursday, the 17<sup>th</sup>. The entrance fee is \$10. The total cost will be ~\$30. Does anybody have any idea for fieldtrips?

**Historian**: Kathy Neiman had suggested we make up Tea blocks from through the years to display at the Tea. Lenore Clarke will look electronically for Tea blocks from the past. Block patterns could be sold at the tea.

**Hospitality**: The sign-up sheet was passed around

### January Program

We will be building string blocks in three groups. Your strings can be the same width, or varying widths. We will have an AccuQuilt cutter if desired. Remember the triangular strips cut off your yardage when squaring it up. Those "scraps" that are usually thrown out are perfect for this use. For best results, strip should be at least 1 inch wide.

Group 1--please bring red, white and blue strips. Group 2--bring green, purple and orange strips Group 3-- bring black, white, and lime green strips Group 4--bring brown, tan, and cream strips Group 5- multi

We will have sewers, rippers, and trimmers for each group. There are 5 folks bringing sewing machines. Please bring any color thread, basic sewing supplies, rotary cutter, mats, straight ruler at least 12 inches long. Whatever color strips you bring, will decide your group. They can be 30's, batiks, floral, tone-on-tone, solids, whatever is "scrap" in your stash. If you have some strips that just don't fit in your stash, bring them and share with the pile. Strips should be at least 7 inches long.

If you prefer to build your blocks at home, sew strips onto a piece of telephone book paper that is 7 inches square. Use a "flip and sew" technique. For this exercise we will be sewing horizontally, not at a diagonal.

### Getting to Know You

### Lenore Clarke

Born near Buffalo, NY, Lenore remembers <u>plenty</u> of snow and even playing field hockey with a <u>green</u> ball in *October* because of the light snow on the ground... not this year! She attended Nursing school at Pitt, went back to work at Buffalo Children's hospital, then on to Strong Memorial in Rochester. While here she earned a Master's at the Univ. of Rochester and became a Pediatric Nurse Practitioner, then as an NP in Primary Care.

As a child she was taught to sew by her mother who had been handed down this skill from several generations. At age 8, Lenore was assigned the task of embroidering "Alabama, cotton state" on a state applique quilt. Her mother finished most of the quilt while Lenore labored over the pink embroidery (yes, she still harbors an aversion to the color pink)! As an adult, Lenore was still finishing some of her grandmother's quilts.

With two sisters, all of the girls' clothes were made by Lenore's Mom and she recalls her very first "storebought" dress fondly. They had "sister dresses" and she wore all three.

Everyone in the Clark family has a strong connection to the field of pharmaceuticals with husband AJ (38 years) formulating drugs at GSK, twin son #1, a post-doc who wants to do pharma research, twin son #2 a programmer for a pharma research organization and son #3 an architectural engineer specializing in pharmaceutical building construction and retrofitting. Lenore also spent some time working in Pharmacovigilance/Drug Safety here in PA.

Formerly with the Penn Oaks and Main Line guilds, Lenore heard about Loose Threads, a day-time guild that fit her schedule well. Her friend, Janneke, our former member from the Netherlands, brought her along to LT where she has served in many roles. Among them are as committee chair for Membership, Charity, Webmaster, Retreats, serving as President and responsible for the Henrietta Hankin quilt display.

Lenore's interests beyond sewing and quilting are many. She's an avid knitter, addicted to sock knitting, who loves that "Purls of Wisdom" shop in Kimberton. She



is also an active volunteer, sharing her time in many areas of the Hankin library, also with the Spring Mill Senior Living home in their library. Recently she added the Red Cross Disaster Health Services to her volunteer list and in the past she was very active with the United Methodist Volunteers in Mission, traveling to central Alaska, Honduras, and Ghana as well as doing projects in the continental US.

Singing is also an important part of Lenore's life as she joins the Concordia Choral Arts group weekly. Her 3 sons and husband are also active singers. Commercial: Her next concert with the Concordia group is January 16 and 17 in the Paoli/West Chester area.

Lenore tells us that she still hates the color pink (but can we believe that when we picture her cuddling her two small granddaughters?). She is also convinced that <u>applique</u> is a 4-letter word!



# Road Trip, continued



Sixteen guild members recently made a trip to the Michener Museum in Doylestown to see a quilt exhibit featuring 15 new quilts by the American-born, internationally-known textile artist Kaffe Fassett. Fassett designed interpretations of fifteen historical quilts, dating from 1780 to 1949, that he selected from the collection of the Quilt Museum and Gallery, York, UK. The antique quilts that stirred his imagination are displayed alongside

his creations or on plinths because they don't have backing and are too fragile to be wall-hung. The exhibit will be on display through Feb 21, 2016.

The accompanying book, *Heritage Quilts*, was purchased for our library and includes stunning photographs and detailed descriptions of the quilts on display, together with patterns and instructions for each of Kaffe's quilts.

### Congratulations

The National Quilt Museum sponsors an annual contest called 'New Quilts from Old Favorites'. The museum describes their contest in this way: "Created to acknowledge our quiltmaking heritage and to recognize innovation, creativity, and excellence, the contest challenges today's quiltmakers to interpret a single traditional quilt block in a new and exciting work of their own design." The featured quilt block for the 2016 contest was New York Beauty. Laurie Kelly and Linda Hamel worked together throughout this past year on their entry. They were thrilled when notified in December that they finished 12<sup>th</sup> of 18 finalists. As finalists their quilt, New York's Beauty, will be exhibited at AQS quilt shows over the next two years, beginning with Paducah's National Quilt Museum exhibit from March 2 – May 16, 2016. In addition, they will be included in the book featuring the 18 finalists of the 2016 contest to be released later this year.


#### Retreats
