January Program

At our program meeting in January Jane Russell will be showing us how to make 'fidget' quilts. These embellished, textural items are used to occupy the nervous hands of those suffering from dementia. The quilts are kept rather small so they will fit on a person's lap. They are usually comprised of 16 squares of fabric of different textures, such as wool, fleece, corduroy, minkie or whatever kinds of scraps you may have on hand. Embellishments are also an important feature of these guilts. For these think more of larger items so they will not be a swallowing hazard – although all items will be securely fastened. Bring zippers, large buttons, keys, empty thread spools, large beads – any item you think might interest busy hands.

Bring any of the supplies described above to contribute to the program, along with a rotary cutter, ruler and mat. Bring your sewing machine if you'd like to work on the project at the meeting or you can gather all your fabric and embellishments at the workshop and assembly your fidget quilt at home.

January Block of the Month

Snowball and 9 Patch Blocks



Snowball

Cut 1 - 6 1/2" square of Dark (Penn State) blue - tone on tone is fine

Cut $4 - 2\frac{1}{2}$ squares of White - tone on tone is fine

Fold white squares diagonally and press. This creates a sew line to follow or draw your line with a pencil. Put right side of the white square in one corner of blue square and sew on diagonal line. Trim seam to $\frac{1}{4}$ and press triangle out to form finished corner. Repeat this 3 more times to complete the 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ block.



Nine Patch

Cut 4 – 2 1/2" squares of Dark (Penn State) blue

Cut $5 - 2\frac{1}{2}$ squares of White

Observing color placement, assemble into 9 patch which will finish as a 6 ½" block.

Do **NOT** sew the 9 patch and snowball block together.

Quilt Shops in Hawaii

After sailing five days to Hawaii, taking classes and quilting each day, we arrived in Maui as our first island to explore for two days. On the first day, my daughter figured out how we could take buses to two quilt shops.

Sew Special in Kahului, Maui, was the first shop. It was the perfect place to find backings for the quilts we were making on the ship. There were rows and rows of Hawaiian fabric. There were other fabrics also, batiks and novelties especially. My eye caught a kit to make a pineapple table runner, something I have always wanted to do. In fact, I made this table runner rather than finishing making all 80 paper pieced blocks for a quilt that I wanted to redesign anyway.

The second quilt shop was a bus ride away in Kihei, Maui. The **Maui Quilt Shop** was smaller but still contained Hawaiian fabrics along with other fabrics. A Hawaiian quilt pattern and a pineapple ornament were more interesting to me although my companions were able to come away with more fabric.

Two buses were needed to return to the ship. Traffic in Maui is ridiculous and we were sure we were not going to make it back in time for the luau. Thus I had my first experience with Uber.

Quilt Passions in Kailua Kona, Hawaii opened just for us, well, all the Stitichin' Heaven people actually. One woman gave a demonstration of traditional Hawaiian quilting, Lots of fabric including two fabrics which were exclusive to the shop.

Vacation wise this satisfied my love of quilting and my love of travel.



Getting to Know You

It's time to learn more about that award-winning quilter who also produces our excellent monthly newsletter! Linda was born in Waterford, New York, not far from Albany, and is second oldest of four children. She studied Medical Technology at Hudson Valley Community College, then went on to the University of Buffalo where she earned a BA in Biology. Back in Rensselaer, a job opportunity at the local pharmaceutical company, Sterling Winthrop Research Institute, was fortuitous as she met her future husband, Doug, working in the same department. They married in 1983 and she acquired three stepsons; one of whom has led to her three grandchildren and 2 greatgrandchildren.

Linda's talented mother taught her to sew, but her first love was making porcelain reproduction dolls, pouring molds, painting faces, designing clothes, etc. She turned out a lot of these beautiful creatures for a number of years. Then, a group move of scientists brought Linda and Doug to Collegeville, PA where they have happily resided for 23 years. She was one of the first biologists at the large Kodak-funded pharmaceutical facility in Collegeville (now a GlaxoSmithKline site) but only one year after she arrived, Kodak withdrew from pharmaceuticals, leaving Linda and her husband without work. She then joined another local research firm, Rhone-Poulenc Rorer, for five years and when they decided to merge and lay off staff, Linda was very fortunate to RETIRE at age 50!

Linda made her first quilt during the bi-centennial year and it was hand-tied. She then started making charity quilts, especially children's quilts, for hospitals. She loved buying fabric and often shopped with her friend, Sandy Michalec (an associate Loose Threads member now living in Washington State) who was a fellow member of the Valley Forge Guild. Sandy attended our Tea one year and learned about our day-time Guild and encouraged Linda to join with her in 2000 and the rest is history! Loving all kinds of quilting, some of Linda's favorites are Civil War fabrics, modern fabrics and anything that catches her eye. She started collecting Japanese fabrics at one time and, as soon as she had enough, she presented a fabulous large Japanese-themed quilt at our Show 'n Tell.

One of her special experiences was working with Laurie Kelly to design and make an entry in the AQS contest "New Quilts from an Old Favorite" where they placed 12th of 18 finalists. This past spring she visited Paducah, KY



where their quilt was displayed at the AQS Museum and seeing their original designed quilt on the museum wall was most thrilling. This quilt is touring at AQS shows nationwide for another year and is scheduled for exhibit at the Lancaster show next March. Linda has also displayed quilts at other quilt shows, including Peddler's Village and at the Oaks quilt shows.

Always busy, Linda has served in many roles within Loose Threads, as President and Treasurer. She was also Tea Chair two years and has led many discussion groups at our Teas. Most recently, we appreciate her talents that she uses to produce our wonderfully interesting, informative and colorful newsletters. Linda has also traveled widely and, when home, she enjoys her flower gardens and reading books. Her family and friends are very important to her and she is thankful for the many friends that she has made at Loose Threads who have greatly enriched her life.

Cookie Recipes From Lenore

Springerles, a German anise cookie.

When you are tired of all the chocolate, and just want a yummy cookie with hot tea...

Make these at Thanksgiving to enjoy at Christmas

8 eggs

4 c. sugar

2 t. anise flavoring

¼ t. salt

3 t. baking powder 9 c. flour

2 t. anise seed in dough,

additional for bottoms

Beat sugar and eggs with mixer until very foamy, about 10 minutes. Add flour 2c, then 2 c. etc. Batter is very stiff. Let rest and/or chill for 30 min. ("set outside in cold for 15-25 minutes")

Roll out dough ¼ " thick, the width of your springerle rolling pin (If you don't have a springerle rolling pin, just roll out ¼ " inch thick dough). Cut apart squares. Pick up the cookie and press into saucer of 2T anise seeds getting about 10 seeds on the bottom of the cookie. Place cookies on cookie sheet sprayed with Pam. These do not spread, so can be placed very close together. Place cookies sheets overnight in a cool place (garage?)

Bake at 350 for 10-12 minutes; do not brown. Place cookies in a tightly covered tin and <u>let mellow 1 month</u>. If needed, can add a few slices of apple on a paper towel for a few days to help soften them. Yield 10 dozen.

Scotcheroos

1 c. clear Karo and 1 c. white sugar. Heat in saucepan on medium heat, stirring regularly, until just boiling. Boil too long, and you'll have tooth-breakers. Take off the heat and stir in 1 ¼ cup peanut butter -creamy or chunky. Once evenly dispersed, pour over 6 cups of Rice Krispies in a large bowl.

Spray a 9x13 pan with Pam. Spread Rice Krispie mix into pan. Use fingers to smoosh down and compact slightly. The smooshing helps the cookies stick together.

In a 4 cup Pyrex measuring cup add 1 ¼ cups EACH of chocolate chips and butterscotch chips. Melt in microwave. I zap for one minute, stir, zap another minute, then take out. The heat in the chocolate will help melt any remainders, as you stir till smooth. Pour over Rice Krispies. Spread all the way to the corners. Don't gyp anyone of the chocolate goodness.

Safe to cut after 30 minutes in refrigerator. I loosen the sides, then invert pan on breadboard, and cut from the back.
