DAR Trip

On June 9th Loose Threads members and friends enjoyed a bus trip to the DAR Museum in Washington DC. In *Eye on Elegance*, the Museum used its rich holdings of Maryland and Virginia quilts to examine regional styles prior to 1860. Featured were 36 quilts demonstrating Appliqué and Pieced techniques, Baltimore Album and "Migration"- designs that emigrated with their makers. The quilts which survive display elegance and skill, disproving the old myth that quilting arose from dire necessity. We then toured Period Rooms, Yochim Gallery and the Library at the museum.

The weather was perfect for our stroll to lunch at the Department of the Interior building. We enjoyed their great cafeteria and gift shop while others dined at the Red Cross building nearby.

On our way home, we stopped at Bear's Paw Fabrics in Towson, MD. Not your average quilt shop, they carry a wide selection of cotton fabrics, batiks, threads, wool, batting, books, patterns, plus an amazing collection of Accuquilt dies. Something for everyone and the shop owner gave us a generous discount on our purchases. Long lines at the checkout were fine as we chatted and were given fat quarters to console us. Owner Judy kindly donated a beautiful jelly roll that was won, lottery style by Kathy DeCarli.

Michener Museum Exhibit

Blanket Statements: New Quilts by Kaffe Fassett and Historical Quilts from the collection of the Quilt Museum & Gallery, York, UK November 14, 2015 through February 21, 2016

The Michener Museum is proud to be one of only two museums in the U.S. to host this stellar textile exhibition of 35 historical and contemporary quilts with trans-Atlantic ties (shown in England as Ancestral Gifts). The exhibition features fifteen new quilts, designed by the American-born, internationally-known textile artist Kaffe Fassett, that were created in response to fifteen historical quilts, dating from 1780 to 1949, that he selected from the collection of the Quilt Museum and Gallery, York, UK. Although it comes to the Michener from the United Kingdom, Blanket Statements has strong local connections: three of the new quilts were designed by Bucks County artisans, and ten of them were crafted in the area under Fassett's supervision. To further visitor's exploration of quilting and textile arts in a contemporary context, the Michener is augmenting the exhibition with a number of mixed-media quilted pieces by the contemporary Philadelphia artist Virgil Marti, who frequently integrates textiles into his work.

A book, *Heritage Quilts* will be available for purchase and will include stunning photographs and detailed descriptions of the quilts on display, together with patterns and instructions for each of Kaffe's quilts. Kaffe will also be lecturing and hosting a series of hands-on workshops.

Sounds like a road trip to me!

Getting to Know You

Judy Quintas-Gorman

While sitting with her grandmother at around age 8, Judy recalls being introduced to sewing. She remembers being allowed to observe some fascinating quilting bees that her grandmother participated in, and an interest in quilting was born.

Born on an Army Base in Holibird, MD (near Baltimore), Judy's mother passed away during the childbirth of her sister and Judy was eventually sent to an orphanage near Wommelsdorf, PA. At age ten, she lived with a family in Spring City and graduated from Spring Ford High School. After high school, she went to work in a law office in Norristown, then moved on to a job in Valley Forge and subsequently met her husband. A move to California found them initially at a desert location, then on to Huntington Beach where they spent five years. The next move to New York resulted in a single life for Judy once again and she earned a college degree in Electron Microscopy in her 40's.

This was the beginning of a most interesting career for Judy. She found work at NYU, working as a Histology tech in Anitonic Pathology and heard they were opening a new lab in West Palm Beach where she headed next for a job that included grossing. All tissues from the OR came to her for grossing (slice and dice they called it) to be examined and processed and then made into slides for the Pathologist. She eventually moved on to the University of Florida (Go Gators!) where she worked in Toxicology for three Medical Coroners (autopsies, forensic pathology, court cases, etc.).

Eventually it was time for retirement and she moved back to Pennsylvania, and is now a road warrior, frequently driving to visit her daughters in New York and in Texas and to Florida to visit



a friend. She is a member of the Amateur Card Carrying World Poker Tour and plays twice a week. At other times she enjoys playing Ma Jong, Pinochle and Bridge. Her interest in quilting resurfaced again and she learned of Loose Threads through Ramona and also from a friend who happens to be a member of the UCC church where we meet. Judy remarked that "Life is Good" and she's enjoying every moment!





My Sewing Space


Judy Peters

Ten years ago my husband and I decided to downsize from the huge house and 3 acre property we lived in for 25 years. The three bedroom rancher on a half-acre in the small town of Honey Brook was our choice. Since two of our three children are local we only needed one of the bedrooms as a guest room. 


I inherited my mom's button collection as she had three aunts who worked in a button factory in the 1940's, so I have a variety of old to new sewing supplies. I am also the keeper of Grandma's Singer Treadle Sewing machine which has the original sales receipt in the top drawer. On Oct 26, 1924 Grandpa paid \$92 for it. This was very good deal because it was



"guaranteed for 15 years against mechanical imperfections". Living in Amish country we were able to replace some of the belts etc. and it is in working order. My intention of making one quilt on it hasn't happened yet.

Block of the Month

Colors: red, white and blue

Unfinished size 12 ½ square

Cut: from red (1) 4 ½ square

(1) 5 1/2 square



(1) 5 % square cut on the diagonal X2, to make 4 triangles

from white (1) 4 ½ square (corner)

(2) 5 1/4 square cut on the diagonal X2, to make 8 triangles

(2) 5 1/2 square

from blue (1) 5 1/2 square

(1) 5 1/4 square cut on the diagonal X2, to make 4 triangles

Use the 2 white 5 % squares and match 1 with the red and 1 with the blue 5 % squares and make a HST from each

You will have an extra blue and white HST

Match 4 white triangles with 4 red and the other 4 white triangles with the blue and make 4 hour glass blocks

Follow the picture for placement
