### Block of the Month



You will be assembling your quilt top and adding borders. Remember to square and trim your top. Before adding the borders, your quilt top should measure 32 ½" x 43 ½". The borders in the picture are 1" inner and 4" outer <u>finished</u>. (add ½" seam allowance on each when cutting) Feel free to go creative! Bind as desired.

### Getting to Know You

### Jane Russell

Just WHO is this Jane Russell who has introduced so many of us to Loose Threads? Born on the South coast of England in the seaside town of Bournemouth, Jane moved near Oxford at age 3½ led by her father's career with the British Government at an Atomic Energy Research Establishment. As a Scholarship Girl at an exclusive boarding school, Jane attended high school where she mixed with the daughters of world leaders in politics and business and felt like a "fish out of water" but earned a great education. Her first job was in the Science Library at Harwell (England's "DuPont"), then transferred to the Solid State Physics Group where she was the Administrative Officer – and loved it.

Jane moved to the USA with her husband for a 2-year project <u>40</u> years ago. Their first stop was in chilly Minnesota where they stayed 8 years, then on to toasty Texas for 4 years and finally to Pennsylvania where they have happily resided ever since.

Her introduction to sewing was at Night School when she was in her teens. Her first project was a lined wool sleeveless dress which she couldn't get over her head because she efficiently sewed up the back seam instead of putting in a zipper! Having never seen a photo of a quilt, she started her first one in England while in her 20's: lots and lots of hexagons backed with English newspaper. It traveled to MN with her where she was told that the newspaper and magazine pieces were more interesting than the fabrics. Maggie Malone's 101 Patchwork Patches was her first quilt teacher and Corn Flakes boxes her first templates – enough to get her hooked! Her favorite sewing today is any handwork – proper applique, buttonhole stitch, wool, embroidery, etc.

Jane and her husband, Don, are the parents of four children: Rachel, Clive (who resides in England), Claire and Becca, all who have become people of whom she is most proud. They have five grandchildren, 3 in London and 2 in New York. In 1990, as her children began to move on and always eager to enjoy a new challenge, Jane decided to open her own quilt shop in Eagle, not far from their Chester Springs home. Her son made a sign for her first shop and when asked what she would call it, without hesitation Jane replied "Tudor Rose," a nod to her English past.

As a shop owner she loved meeting all kinds of quilters, teaching young children and adults and encouraging an



addiction to quilting. Tudor Rose grew and eventually expanded into space at Ludwig's Corners, (always allowing room for a large, friendly dog)! The shop was a magnet for quilters from near and far and she was often asked whether there were any quilt guilds in the area whereby she directed many to the local daytime quilt guild called Loose Threads. After 15 years in her shop, she announced her retirement and when asked what she was looking forward to, Jane's reply was "Joining Loose Threads!" Although the Guild was at full capacity at the time, Jane became member #51 until she was "legal" as she was responsible for referring so many of us who became members. She has served in many capacities within the guild. A few years ago, they downsized from their spacious home to a lovely retirement community, Jenner's Pond in Southern Chester County, now faithfully driving 1 hr. 15 minutes each way to attend our meetings in Spring City.

Aside from quilting, Jane's interests are many depending upon the season and time of day. They include knitting, reading, gardening, cooking and travel. Jane's father challenged his daughters to be kind whenever possible and, if they couldn't change the world, to at least brighten a corner. These are words she lives by and she has certainly brightened the corner of our Loose Threads world with her many abilities and kind, sharing manner.

### Bird & Word Challenge

#### **REMINDER:**

- Quilts are due at our December 2016 holiday meeting and must be finished. Keep your project secret. Don't show it to anyone before the reveal.
- You must put two elements on the front of the quilt. At least one bird, and at least one word. The word(s) may be in any language.
- You can use any technique; including using commercial fabric containing words and birds. You may also write and draw directly on your quilt
- Maximum perimeter is 160 inches. May be smaller, but not larger.
- Clothing or other quilted items (handbags, pillows, TUFFETS! etc.) are acceptable.

Search online for inspiration and techniques. Pinterest has 1000+ ways to add words to a quilt. Many of the sites have free downloadable letters in multitudes of styles. You can applique, draw, or quilt these letter styles.

Free Paper-pieced letters patterns are also available for free if you search for them.




## June Program - Fiber Lace Scarves


The June workshop will be creating fiber lace scarves. You will need your sewing machine as well as basic sewing supplies. You will also need water soluble stabilizer (Sulky Solvy or Super Solvy); threads of different types, weights, and colors especially metallic for shimmer; and decorative fibers, yarns and ribbons in various weights and colors. Your stabilizer needs to be 54" to 60" long. If using Sulky Solvy, I recommend 54" long since it comes in 9 yd rolls and this would enable you to get 3 scarves out of the roll. Also bring either a very fine mist water bottle or spray adhesive and wax paper to place under the stabilizer.

I will bring my containers of yarn and ribbor to share for anyone who likes the colors that have or wants to add more to your own combination. This is a fun, easy technique that enables you to create a unique scarf befitting your personality. I can't wait to see what everyone chooses.






