Trip to Paducah, Kentucky

As most of you know, Laurie Kelly and I were among the 18 finalists for this year's New Quilts from Old Favorites contest sponsored by The National Quilt Museum. All of these quilts are currently on display at the museum, so my husband and I decided to make the trip to see them.

The National Quilt Museum, founded by Meredith and Bill Schroeder, opened its doors in April of 1991. (They are celebrating their 25th anniversary!) The largest fiber arts museum in the world displays "Honoring Today's Quilts" in large letters over the front entrance which highlights the museum's mission to honor and promote the work of today's quiltmaker. In fact, while their exhibits may on occasion include vintage guilts on loan to enhance a temporary exhibit, their entire collection of approximately 500 guilts dates only from 1980. The AQS show held every April in Paducah, Kentucky is the 2nd largest quilt show in the US. Each year the show awards cash prizes to the winners in a number of categories, for example, the Best of Show award is \$20,000. If the quiltmaker decides to accept the prize money, then that quilt becomes part of the collection of the National Quilt Museum.

As you enter the museum there is a light filled atrium decorated with hanging stained glass panels, many mimicking quilt designs. There are classrooms, conference rooms and a gift shop located off this area. The exhibit area features a

large central room with two smaller galleries on either side used for temporary displays. (The quilts on display in the main gallery change periodically.) There is a small section at the front of the main gallery which contains all the miniature quilts.









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A guided tour is available which I highly recommend. Carole led our hour long tour and she was so knowledgeable about all the artists and quilts adding so much to the experience. I was really disappointed that NO photography was allowed within the galleries...unless the quiltmaker gives permission. So, I was able to pose with our quilt!

The NQM is the most popular tourist attraction in the area and was the spark for the rejuvenation of downtown Paducah. This river port town, founded in 1827, lies along the juncture of the Ohio River and Tennessee River. The downtown area has charming 19th century buildings containing a number of restaurants, galleries and shops.

Can't visit Paducah without a stop at Hancock's of Paducah...think the <u>superstore</u> of fabric. Bolts and bolts of fabric are arranged alphabetically by manufacturer with dozens of hanging quilts displayed overhead. Prices were great at \$9.99 /yard with many, many markdowns to \$4.99, probably in anticipation of upcoming Quilt Week. There were also loads of patterns, batting, thread, upholstery and decorator fabrics, all adding to the riot of color.

Everywhere I went in the area, at the museum, Hancock's, restaurants and local sites, the people were all so very friendly and helpful. If you're a quilter, put Paducah on your bucket list!

At the Tuesday workshop she will show us how to make a Tuffet pillow for a wooden stool. Participants may also make the stool for the pillow. Cost of the full kit will be \$100.00. This kit will include supplies for the stool and the pillow. Members can buy their own supplies at Home Depot or Lowes and the foam at JOANNs. The speaker will provide cut foam for the project for \$25.00. If a member buys her own supplies the pattern for the tuffet cover will be \$11.00. There will be more information at the next meeting.

<u>Membership</u>: There are 2 people on the waiting list.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Mary Lou Boryta reviewed the expenses and the profit earned from the TEA. She finished with an account of all of the Guild's expenses and income.

May Tuffet Workshop with Erin Underwood

Supplies Needed: \$11 Class fee which includes pattern & covered button

Mat, long ruler & rotary cutter
Basic Sewing supplies, machine & ¼" foot
Thread to match
Strong twine & pencil
Staple gun & staples, if you have one

Fabric: Tuffet: 24 strips cut 3"x 21 ½", ½ yard or fat quarter of black to cover bottom, 2 squares 40 x 40" batting, one 4" square to cover button

A kit of additional items you will need for the stool is available from the teacher for \$100. (Or you can purchase separately yourself)

- 18" round circle of plywood
- 4 pre-made legs and hardware to attach them (i.e. Waddell Straight Top Plates from Lowes)
- Foam 6" high 18" round circle (if 8" high is preferred, get 36" of 4" tall foam; for 6" high tuffet use 36" of 3" tall foam and circles can be cut in class.)

Service Projects: Comfort Quilts

<u>Merriam Webster</u> indicates that the word "comfort" in the transitive verb form means to give strength and hope to; or ease the grief or trouble of (cheer, console). We all need comfort as some point in our lives, and equipping a culture that spontaneously encourages acts of comfort is a genuine need in the world today.

During the month of April Loose Threads was able to donate, to three separate organizations, some of the Comfort Quilts that we made at the March basting meeting. Fantastic. The first organization was **Designing 4 Hope** and the quilt will go to a little boy who was diagnosed with Pre-B Cell Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia. He is having a dinosaur/ car bedroom makeover once enough funds are raised to renovate the room.

The second organization was **The Salvation Army** in Pottstown that has a shelter for families in crisis. They took the bulk of our Comfort quilts for families who come into the shelter. There is always a need for the people to receive comfort at the shelter.

The last organization was **Project Purpose** in Pottstown that serves students and families in the Pottsgrove area School District. The Comfort Quilt went to a mother who just lost a baby.

Overwhelmingly, the quilts where gratefully received. Each receiving organization has a unique need for the quilts and we have a great opportunity to expand giving to them in the future.

Carolyn Ferrandino sent along her cake recipe that everyone so enjoyed at the March guild meeting.

Lemon Buttermilk Pound Cake

Ingredients

For Cake:

3 cups all purpose flour

½ tsp baking soda

½ tsp salt

2 sticks (1 cup) unsalted butter, softened

2 ¼ cups granulated sugar

3 large eggs

1 cup buttermilk (low fat is fine)

2 Tbsp grated lemon zest, packed (need 4-5 large lemons)

2 Tbsp fresh lemon juice

For the Glaze:

1 cup confectioners' sugar

2 Tbsp fresh lemon juice

½ tsp grated lemon zest, packed

1 tsp unsalted butter, melted

Preheat oven to 325. Spray 10 inch Bundt pan with cooking spray and dust with flour.

In a medium bowl, whisk together flour baking soda and salt. Set aside. In another bowl, combine buttermilk, lemon zest and lemon juice.

With electric mixer, cream together butter and sugar until light and fluffy. (~3-4 minutes) Scrap down the sides, add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition

With mixer a low speed, beat in about a quarter of the flour mixture, then one third of the buttermilk mixture. Repeat until all of the flour and buttermilk are added. Then mix well until all ingredients are well incorporated.

Spoon the thick batter in to prepared Bundt pan with rubber spatula. Bake 1 hour and 5 minutes or until cake tester comes out clean.

Cool cake in the pan on a rack for 10 minutes.

Meanwhile prepare the syrup. Combine the water and sugar in a saucepan and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and add lemon juice.

Remove the warm cake onto the rack. Slip a large piece of parchment paper or aluminum foil under the rack to catch excess syrup and glaze. Gradually brush the syrup over the cake, letting it soak in. Allow the cake to cool completely, about 1 hour.

When cake is cool, make the glaze. Combine conf. sugar, lemon and butter in a medium bowl, mixing with a fork until smooth. Spoon the glaze over the top of the cake, letting it drizzle down the sides.

1/3 cup water

1/3 cup granulated sugar

2 Tbsp fresh lemon juice




Block of the Month

Cut piece background fabric 334" x 7" (32' x 6" finish)

Using different fabrics for each make 2 each of the following:



Cut: 3" Finish fabric 1: -2 - 178" Squares 4 - 12"

Fabric 2: 2 - 178" St.
1 - 12" St.
1 - 12" St.


Using 176" squares make 4 haff sq. triangle squares and piece as & hown.
Trim to 36" sq.
