Hello Loose Threads,

As we head into November we are just weeks away from displaying our challenge quilts - plenty of time to join in the fun! If you don't already have an idea it's easier than you think. Then you have lettuce, tomatoes and onions or tomatoes, mozzarella cheese and basil. Not only that, your salad challenge can become a Christmas decoration - you're ahead of the game!

Do you have browns and beiges? How about potato salad? Or chicken salad? Lots of purple scraps? Add purple leaf lettuce, onions or purple potatoes to jazz up the mix. Look through your magazines and books for an easy pattern or just try a simple 9-patch. It's the "salad" ingredients you put together that will make this fun. Keep it small and simple and you're sure to get it done. Check the guidelines again before starting.

It would be great to see lots of salad quilts hanging on display in December, and will be really fun to guess who made each one.

Fabric Exchange

The fabric exchange for 2014-2015 will be a **FLOWER** theme. All blocks should be cut 6 ½ inches square. Fabric can have the color of the month in the flowers or in the background. Please make sure all blocks have flowers on them.

October - Orange/fall flowers
November - Brown/mini flowers
December - Red/holiday inspired
January - Blue/ mini flowers
February - Red/ roses
March - Green
April - Yellow
May - Tropical flowers
June - Multi color/mini flowers
July - red, white or blue
August - Aqua or teal flowers



Please cut 11 (eleven) $6 \frac{1}{2}$ " squares (This amount has been increased since the business meeting.) Put each month's squares in one zip lock bag marked with your name and the month. I need each month to have it's own baggie.

You may turn in more than one month at a time or the entire year. If you plan on being away, please turn in your squares before you leave. Keep in mind that we cannot distribute the month until everyone has turned them in. Don't keep folks waiting!

REMEMBER: SQUARES ARE 6 ½" - NOT 6 "

We'd like to assemble a master list of various specialty rulers owned by guild members who would be willing to loan them out. Blue Lake Retreat



Fun at retreat!

October 2, 2014

What is a RETREAT all about? Since there are a number of Loose Threads members who have not yet experienced a "Retreat"... let's take a look at the recent Blue Lake Retreat from September 29-October 2.

- Originally built to accommodate several Amish families, the Blue Lake house is large: 14 bedrooms, 6 bathrooms, 3 kitchens, dining table with 24 chairs, comfortable sitting/reading area with rockers, living room furnished with huge leather sofas (used for Services when the Amish/Mennonite guests stay over weekends), scenic open space to feast your eyes upon while sitting on the porch and lots of convenient parking. Most importantly, the attached garage area used for quilting retreats is fitted out with 8' tables, adjustable chairs, excellent lighting, A/C, ironing boards and a number of electrical outlets. Approximately 18 work stations can be accommodated in this space.
- The Retreat house is located about 3 miles from Burkholders fabric store between Lancaster and Reading, an easy one- hour drive via Turnpike or on local roads from Spring City.
- Guests bring their own linens, pillows and quilts, sewing machines and projects, breakfast foods and snacks. Other meals are pre-scheduled for teams of 2 or more to prepare for all.



Special Features:

- Quilters are often coaxed into the kitchen in the mornings by the fragrance of warm cinnamon buns made by a guild member who regularly starts her day at 5:00am!
- Need some help? There are always more experienced quilters from whom to extract immediate opinions, ideas, shortcuts, and more.
- •Running out of something? Burkholders and Sauders are just minutes away.
- Caution: Loose Threads quilters are also excellent bakers so the number of available cookies and cakes can be a real challenge but there are usually an equal amount of colorful fruits from which to choose.

Note: We toured a new retreat facility in the same vicinity which will be available to us in 2015: The Cocalico Quilters Inn is a newly refurbished old stone house, part of which was built in the 1700's. More details on this Inn will be forthcoming.


