Minutes – October Meeting

Betty Ann Dawson called the meeting to order at 10:10 A.M.

Announcements:

- Please keep these members in your thoughts: Linda Glass's husband is in hospice care. Carolyn Ferrandino's husband was in surgery on the 7th. Clem Dupont's husband is receiving medical treatment.
- Lenore Clarke will find out if the guild will do another display at the Henretta Hankin Library.
- Should the Guild enter a quilt in the Kutztown Fair? The Fair will be held in July and they have a category for entries from quilt groups.
- The Kimberton Fair will also be held in July. They accept needle work such as applique and embroidery.
- Liz Bidell suffered loss from fire damage in her home. Through discussion it was concluded that since she is a quilt maker and has recovered some of her quilts she did not need a gift quilt. It was felt that donating money was the best way to help her. Selling \$5.00 raffle tickets for a Baby Lock will help raise money for her. Rosemary Geisler has the tickets.
- Books novels, fiction, mysteries, etc., that belong to the Guild, are available in the Maple Room and available to check out. Most of these books include the topic of quilting in the story.
- Basting meeting in September saw two quilts successfully basted. Kitty's large needles were a hit and the members were all in favor of Kitty purchasing an additional supply.



Dark Blue: 1-63" Square Asstilights to make: 2 strips 2" x 262"


Asst reds + make: 2 strips 2" x 262" 1 strip 2" x 322"

It with Flowers challenge rules. You may use a quilt pattern with flower designs or choose <u>any</u> kind of pattern, but then make it with floral fabric...or you can do both!

- Your quilt can employ any construction technique i.e. paper-pieced, applique
- Your quilt should be no larger than 40" x 40" (or 160" circumference)
- It may be any quilted item such as quilt, clothing, bag, pillow, etc.
- Your quilt must be made during the coming year, January December 2015
 Completed challenge quilts will be displayed and voted on at the next month's Holiday Brunch.

Lonni Rossi is an accomplished graphic designer, internationally known fabric designer, color specialist, art quilt maker, pattern designer and teacher. Her work is a dance between design, composition, color and texture, with the goal always to find balance between these elements. Lonni Rossi became interested in quilting in the early 80's, but didn't make what she considers her first "art quilt" until 1994. She worked as a professional graphic designer for many years, and has taught graphic design and typography at both Moore College of Art & Design and Drexel University. She was a co-founder of Art Quilt Elements (the former Art Quilts at the Sedgwick). She has participated in many group shows locally and nationally, and has had one-woman art quilt shows in Philadelphia, Munich and London.

Recipes from Jane Russell

Millie's Zucchini Slosh

Tomatoes
Aubergines (egg plants)
Zucchini
Onions (twice as many as any other vegetable)
Peppers
2 cloves garlic
Sprig of rosemary

Slice zucchini, peel and seed aubergines, slice or dice peppers. Slice onions and cook gently in large heavy saucepan in oil for 10 minutes. Add all the rest of the ingredients with a small branch of rosemary, salt and pepper. Cook covered until tender (about 30 minutes). When done leave uncovered for about another 15 minutes until steam evaporate and it has thickened.



Toasty Cheese Crackers

Ingredients for 6 dozen crackers:

2 cups shredded Cheddar Cheese

½ cup grated Parmesan cheese or Blue cheese

½ cup butter or margarine, softened

3 Tbsp water

1 cup flour

½ tsp salt

1 cup uncooked oats

3/4 oregano or basil

- Beat together cheese, butter and water until well blended.* Add flour and salt, mix well. Stir in oats, mixing until well blended.
- Shape dough to form 12-inch long roll (or 2 6-inch rolls, easier). Wrap securely and refrigerate at least 4 hours or overnight.
- Cut into ¼ slices and flatten slightly. Arrange on lightly greased baking sheet or parchment paper.
- Bake at 400° for 8 10 minutes or until edges are light golden brown. Remove immediately and cool on rack.

For variety, add any of these to cheese mix before adding flour: Chili powder, Garlic, Chopped chives or onions, Fresh chopped basil, Lipton onion soup mix


*You don't need an electric mixer. I use a flat wooden spatula and clean hands!

2016 Tea Block


Disappearing Hourglass Block

Colors: Use a medium to dark blue and off white or cream

Cut two 10" squares, place right sides together and sew ¼" completely around the outside edges. Cut diagonally twice. Carefully press each of the four 6 ¼"half square triangle blocks (some bias edges!) These measurements are based on my machine's ¼". Don't worry of yours are slightly larger or smaller.




Arrange and sew as shown into hourglass block, paying attention to placement of light & darks. This block should be slightly less than $12 \frac{1}{2}$ ".




Divide into three equal sections of 4 ½" each. Cut vertically. Turn cutting mat 90 degrees. Divide into three equal sections of 4 ½" each. There will be 9 equal size squares.

Flip different sections as shown in figure, checking to See that the block will look like the finished block design below. Then sew each row together into a 9-patch.

After sewing together, the block should look like the design below and measure slightly less than 11 ½".





This is a Missouri Star Quilt Company design. Before you begin, check out the excellent tutorial which will help you in making this Tea block.
