# Quilt Shop Review

#### Web Fabrics

I discovered Web Fabrics a year ago, in the summer of 2013. My mission among the vendors at the 2013 Hershey quilt show was to find some blender fabric in brown that could be used as picture frames on my mom's 90<sup>th</sup> birthday photo quilt. I searched all the vendors and found what I needed at a large booth in the center called Web Fabrics. In fact, they had several blender fabrics that could fit the bill. They even helped me pick out the perfect color thread. Mission accomplished!

I was delighted to learn that this shop not only has an online store, but also a brick and mortar local business located in Purcellville, VA. A friend told me she had been there and that this was about a three-hour drive and located south of Gettysburg, PA and about one hour west of Washington, DC.

So this summer (2014), I was taking a trip to Asheville, NC. I planned my driving to swing through Purcellville, and visit Web Fabrics' brick and mortar store. So glad I did! The store is very well stocked and super-tempting. So many of the new fabric lines, I can't list them all. But you can view their inventory at their beautiful website: www.webfabrics.net

I saw many kits and patterns, as well as complete collections of many fabric lines (especially blender fabrics) in all the colorways



available. I kept picking out different bolts of fabric and carried them around dreaming of possible projects. It was a tough decision, but I finally settled on bringing home some yardage from Kaffe Fassett's recently released line, Guinea Flowers. In my mind, you can't go wrong with Kaffe!

I was happy to see the staff busy cutting and preparing products to take to the 2014 Hershey show. When I visited the Web Fabric booth at Hershey this year, they remembered me being at their store. My recommendation is that this shop is definitely worth visiting, either online or at the brick and mortar location in Purcellville, VA. You will definitely find that perfect blender to complete a UFO or something new to inspire you.



October seems like a good time to try one of the 'Blue Lake' recipe favorites make by Carolyn Thompson. Delicious!

#### **Pumpkin Scones**

**Scones:** 2 cups flour 6 T. cold butter

7 T. sugar ½ cup canned pumpkin

1 T. baking powder 3 T. half-and-half

½ tsp. ground cinnamon 1 large egg

½ tsp. ground nutmeg ¼ tsp. ground ginger

½ tsp. ground cloves

Powdered Sugar Glaze: 1 c. powdered sugar, 1 T. powdered sugar, 2 T. whole milk

**Spiced Glaze:** 1 cup powdered sugar

3 T. powdered sugar 2 T. whole milk

1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon 1/8 tsp. ground nutmeg

1 pinch ginger

1 pinch ground cloves

#### **Directions for Scones:**

Preheat oven to 425F.

- 1. Lightly oil a baking sheet or line with parchment paper.
- 2. Combine flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, and spices in a large bowl. Using a pastry knife, fork, or food processor, cut butter into the dry ingredients until mixture is crumbly and no chunks of butter are obvious. Set aside.
- 3. In a separate bowl, whisk together pumpkin, half and half, and egg. Fold wet ingredients into dry ingredients. Form the dough into a ball.
- 4. Pat out dough onto a lightly floured surface and form it into a 1-inch thick rectangle (about 9 inches long and 3 inches wide). Use a large knife or a pizza cutter to slice the dough twice through the width, making three equal portions. Cut those three slices diagonally so that you have 6 triangular slices of dough. Place on prepared baking sheet.
- 5. Bake for 14 to 16 minutes. Scones should begin to turn light brown. Place on wire rack to cool.

#### Plain Glaze:

Mix the powdered sugar and 2 tablespoons milk together until smooth. When scones are cool, use a brush to paint plain glaze over the top of each scone. As that white glaze firms up, make the spiced Glaze.

#### Spiced Glaze:

Combine the ingredients for the spiced icing together. Drizzle this thicker icing over each scone and allow the icing to dry before serving (at least 1 hour). A squirt bottle works great for this, or you can drizzle with a whisk.
