American Homestead Quilts by Ellen Murphy



## October Craft Project



Joanne Cantwell saw this great craft project in Country Living magazine that just might appeal to our crafty members. Start with a white pumpkin such as a "Lumina." Cut out design from quilt block template\* (\*countryliving.com/halloween 2016) to create a stencil of desired quilt pattern. (Reduce or enlarge template first on a copy machine to get the size you need.) Tape the stencil to the pumpkin and use a foam stencil paintbrush and acrylic paint to create the pattern.

After all that effort, want to keep those pumpkin projects from year to year? Just use artificial, carvable pumpkins available in craft stores (store.funkins.com).

#### Kaffe Fassett

Wednesday night quilters were flocking to Lancaster County and it wasn't for the usual fabric shopping reasons (well, maybe a little of that). Kaffe Fassett, the internationally renowned fabric designer, was giving a lecture at the Shady Maple banquet facility. The evening began, for the over 300 in attendance, at 4:30 with a soup and salad buffet. The event was sponsored by The Old Country Store so there were tables piled high with jelly rolls, fat quarter packs, patterns and books all glowing with the bright, bold colors Kaffe is known for. Lining the walls of the large banquet hall were over 20 beautiful quilts made by local quilters, all using Kaffe's fabrics. At 7:00 the lecture, entitled *Colorful Inspirations*, began. Kaffe spoke at length about how he started in art and design, why he moved to England, his world travels and what

inspires his designs and color choices. His talk was informative, the slides were amazing and his easy humor so entertaining that the hour just flew by. Finally there was a question & answer period followed by book signing for all the many quilters who had purchased books. Our Loose Threads group was in total agreement – it was a wonderful evening to be remembered!











#### Block of the Month

This year's block of the month theme will be a traditional block exchange. Each month one member will have a block she wants members to make for her and those who make a second block will be eligible to win a set of blocks as well. (Like we do for the Tea).

<u>To participate</u>: The first members to turn in a block design, directions, and a sample will be assigned a month. Their directions will go into the newsletter for their assigned month and they will win <u>all</u> the first round of blocks for that month. Everyone who makes 2 blocks will be eligible for a drawing to win any extra blocks that are turned in that month. Potentially, two people will win blocks each month this year.

To submit a block design, you must have your directions and a sample turned in together. It can be any design and any size up to 12". Keep directions to one page.

To be eligible to win the second set of blocks for any given month, you must follow directions exactly, use a 1/4 inch seam, and turn two blocks in one time. Sorry, but blocks which don't meet the directions will not qualify.

This is an opportunity for all members, beginners to experienced sewers to practice our skills, and to get help with a quilt project. You can make any block, but keeping it simple will no doubt encourage more participation. If you want to submit a block, do it ASAP to Debby O'Keefe. First come, first served.

#### October 2016 Block of the Month - Floating 9 Patch in a Square

Use three **SOLID** fabrics, any colors except white or yellow

To make the 9 patch: cut 5 - 2" squares of color one

cut 4 - 2" squares of color two

Assemble into a 9 patch checkerboard

To make corner triangles: cut 2 - 4 1/2" squares of third color Subcut diagonally into triangles.

To line up the triangles with each 9 patch side, pinch along the diagonal line in half, then pinch the 9 patch in half to find the center of each side. Match the two pieces at the folds, pin in place and sew together. Sew opposite sides first, then remaining sides. Press carefully. DO NOT TRIM!

#### Recipe of the Month

Debby O'Keefe thought folks would enjoy this tasty salad recipe.

#### Asian Green Salad

½ cup margarine or butter
4 chopped scallions
1 head broccoli, chopped
Mixed salad greens
1 pkg Oriental flavor Ramen Noodles, crushed
½ cup sunflower seeds
¾ cup slivered almonds

Dressing: ½ cup olive oil, ¼ cup sugar, ¼ cup balsamic vinegar, 3 Tbsp soy sauce

- Saute seeds, crushed noodles and almonds in margarine until lightly browned. Sprinkle with Ramen seasoning pkg.
- Mix greens, broccoli and scallions. Add dressing and topping when ready to serve.

# Kathy Neiman

Born in Stowe and living there for her first five years, Kathy moved on to Lower Pottsgrove where she grew up and graduated from Pottsgrove High School. Most recently, Kathy has lived with her daughter and family in Spring City, not far from the church where Loose Threads meets.

At the early age of 7 or 8, she learned embroidery from her grandmother and at age 12 her mom taught her how to thread her sewing machine and told her to follow the directions on paper patterns. She learned that this IS the best way to succeed! Kathy's favorite type of quilting has always been hand quilting which she does so well (she feels she's not so good at machine quilting.)

A highlight in her quilting career was the Blue Ribbon she won on a gorgeous large Christmas redwork quilt at the Kimberton Fair a few years ago. We recall the "oohs and aahs" on that one when she brought it to "Show and Tell" at Guild.

Kathy raised her family of 3 children while doing intermittent factory work, some alterations, catering, and many other things... always keeping those needles and threads close by! She enjoys her 8 grandkids and 8 great-grandkids.

While shopping at "Knit and Sew" in Royersford one day, she heard about the Loose Threads Guild, then did a little research on line and about 10 years ago, she joined our guild. Since then, Kathy has served as historian, worked on the basting committee and led a redwork discussion group at one of our Teas. Keeping those needles threaded on Basting Day is also one of her specialties.

Kathy sewed clothes for her twin granddaughters for many years and now has made full size quilts for them for when they start their own housekeeping.



Reading, knitting, crocheting and making crafts also takes up some of her free time (she is a Mug Rug Queen and has lost count of the many mug rugs she has created) and with her contributions to our coffee hour, we can certainly all attest to her wonderful baking skills as well!
