Met my friends in Paris where we boarded a Vantage River Boat for a 10 day journey to Normandy. Normandy is a region in Northern France with very changeable weather. Within 20 minutes we had sunshine and warmth which quickly turned into a driving chilly rain.

The day after we arrived we took a bus tour of the city of Paris. Highlights were the Eiffel Tower, Notre-Dame Cathedral, Avenue des Champs-Elysées and Arc de Triomphe. After lunch we had a tour of the Louvre which to me was much over rated. Way too many crowds and I did not expect to encounter a shopping mall before we got to the ticket booths! I ordered a Great Courses lecture series on the Louvre which I am sure I will enjoy much more. I am not a crowd person. Of note though: before it was a museum, the Louvre was a palace and before that a castle!

Our trip on the Seine took us past many industrial areas but also included some very beautiful limestone hills dotted with picturesque cottages. We visited the Chateau de La Roche-Guyon which was used by German Field Marshall Erwin Rommel as his Normandy headquarters during WWII.

At Pointe du Hoc, US Rangers scaled the cliffs to destroy a German battery that threatened the Omaha Beach landings. At Omaha Beach, US Army infantry overcame fierce resistance. While a lot of our own died we must remember that this was an ALLIED invasion. There are many international cemeteries. Way too many died. The American Cemetery is on land that was given by the French to the US. It is not US soil but is maintained by the US.

My favorite stop was at the Caen Peace Memorial — a museum dedicated to lasting peace, built on the site of an old bunker that you can also tour. This is considered among the best World War II museums in France. They show a split screen movie depicting the allies on the left and the Germans on the right.

At Conflans we took a bus to tour Versailles the spectacular estate of Louis the XIV. We had a guided tour of the state's apartments and time on our own to explore the gardens. LOTS OF CROWDS!

Lower Normandy is predominately agricultural with cattle breeding the most important. Norman cows produce a high quality high fat content milk! YAY cheese! The countryside is a patchwork of small fields with high hedges.

Upper Normandy has a higher concentration of industry.

Normandy is a significant apple producing region known for cider - especially calvados which is a distilled cider or apple brandy. The area is known for horse breeding, fishing, seafood and tourism.

Getting to Know You

Judy Snook

Have you ever contemplated a quilt cruise or an adventure to another continent to study quilting with some well-versed quilt teachers? If you have any questions on the above, Judy Snook is the Loose Threads guild member to ask as she has done it all (almost!).

Born in Illinois and moved 11 times by the age of 4 (her father was a salesman who was sometimes paid in chickens!) Judy grew up with a bit of wanderlust it seems, but when she got to Virginia, her family stayed through her high school years and she went on to graduate from the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg with a degree in Elementary Education. Judy taught at Valley Forge Elementary School right after college, then married Don Snook and taught 5th grade at Fort Knox. She taught kindergarten at Trinity Nursery and Kindergarten and enjoyed seeing the "light bulb" go on in her students' minds.

The first time Judy did any sewing was in her junior high school Home Ec class. Judy's mother was a fine seamstress although when she asked for help with her projects, her mother always encouraged her to do it herself. She advanced to making a checked yoked shirt for her boyfriend and a dress to match for herself while in high school. After marriage she started making quilts for her three children and started to take quilting seriously when her granddaughter (now 22) was born. She joined Loose Threads Quilt Guild when she retired from teaching in 2006 and now enjoys traditional quilting primarily.

Always enjoying travel, an advertisement for a quilt cruise caught her eye and since she passed on her interest in quilting to one of her daughters, she had an easily compatible travel companion. Her quilt trips are many but include: Two trips to Europe, a Scandinavian trip that included the Norwegian fjords, some of Germany and Russia; trips to Iceland, Alaska, the Hawaiian Islands, and the Northeast US coast.



She enjoyed going on safari in Africa along with Alex Anderson and Ricky Tims also. She has also taken lessons at a Super Seminar in MD with Ricky Tims, Alex Anderson, and Libby Lehman.

- Your quilt can employ any construction technique i.e. paper-pieced, applique
- Your quilt should be no larger than 40" x 40" (or 160" circumference)
- It may be <u>any quilted item</u> such as quilt, clothing, bag, pillow, etc.
- Your quilt must be made during the year 2015
