At our meeting on Wednesday, August 19, a program was presented on *Orphan Blocks & 40 Ways to Use Them*. Marie Traxler graciously contributed 18 samples of various ways to use orphan blocks. Can you think of 40 ways to use them? Well, it certainly was an interesting and fun exercise. A survey of attendees was recorded, and we want to share the results with you.

The third segment of the presentation was a list of exercises for quilters. It's important to take breaks, do some stretches and bends; you, too, will notice the difference in how much better you feel after many hours of sewing.

All attendees were given a copy of the entire presentation so that it can be used as a helpful reference.

Getting To Know You

Betty Ann Dawson

...is a busy individual who is picking up the gavel for her 4th term as President of the Loose Threads Quilt Guild! Born into a family with 5 siblings in Brooklyn and Long Island, New York, Betty Ann moved to Pennsylvania at age nine. She remembers wearing lots of homemade matching Easter outfits, pinks and purples, with matching coats and hats, and her Mom taught her to sew doll clothes on an old Singer sewing machine.

Betty Ann has enjoyed several careers over the years and at one time she worked for the Freedom Valley Girl Scouts where she met co-worker Linda Garthe. Although she initially went to school to study geography and urban planning, she eventually found that she really enjoyed working with kids, so earned a teaching certificate. This led to substitute teaching opportunities in Chester, Berks and Montgomery counties, working primarily in Jr. and Sr. high schools. Some of her favorite assignments involved directing musicals at Owen J. Roberts (OJR) and Twin Valley High Schools. It was at OJR where she met Peter Christ. Moving on, the newlyweds bought the 30-acre "Wildberry Farm" near Boyertown where they have lived for thirty years.

In later years, an interest in antiques led Betty Ann to manage her own booth at the Mill Property in Morgantown, then she owned an antique store in Elverson, and eventually formed her own company "Life Simplified" where she made a huge difference for folks who were downsizing by cleaning out houses and taking care of tasks that many individuals don't have time to do for themselves. Now retired from her company she finds more time for making those famous jams, jellies and maple syrup that have won numerous blue ribbons at the Earl Township and Oley Fairs in past years. Certainly not one to "sit around" for long, Betty Ann has also been serving part-time as Assistant Secretary in the Earl Township office as well as delivering deli orders three days a week for a neighborhood deli. She's also an avid collector of Halloween artifacts, even featuring a "Halloween Room" in her house where she enjoys using her Halloween quilt as a tablecloth each Fall.



Betty Ann suffered an enormous family tragedy last August when she lost a son and two of her eight grandchildren in an out-of-state accident. She is proud of the tribute to her family by the hugely successful formation of a scholarship fund in their memory at Exeter High School near Reading.

A few years ago it was a fortuitous excursion to Jane Russell's quilt shop with Linda Garthe that ignited Betty Ann's interest in quilting and a subsequent introduction to the Loose Threads Quilt Guild. She truly enjoys the people and the wide variety of field trips that Guild members take, finds them educational and a wonderful opportunity for Guild camaraderie. Along with Lil Evans, they developed the clever "Day Camps" for LT quilters held at the regular meeting facility in Spring City.

Now beginning the third year, another well-organized Day Camp is planned in October 2020. Lil and Betty Ann are responsible, too, for the expansion and success of the LT Sewing Room at LT annual Teas. She also likes the "Challenges" that pop up at Loose Threads from year to year and found the "Whisper Challenge" particularly fun to see how topics are developed.

When they're not savoring their homemade blueberry wine on the porch, she and Pete have enjoyed some wonderful travels and are very much looking forward to the end of our current pandemic when they can once more get acquainted with new countries, new food and new friends. We welcome Betty Ann back to the helm at Loose Threads again, thank her for leading us into another year and look forward to more fulfilling days.


