I Wanna Go to Shipshewana

I had so much fun at Shipshewana last summer that I am planning to go back next July. (It would be quite a "field trip" for guild members!)

Shipshewana is in Indiana. It is the third most populous Amish area (after Ohio and Lancaster) in the country. There were more buggies than I have ever seen but the good news is you see them traveling on the part of the road made for buggies. Indiana is farm country, flat, and pretty with many baby animals.

But back to why my daughter and I were there. Stitchin' Heaven organized Land Ahoy! events initially like a cruise but on land when covid cancelled cruises. We were there to take one (me) or two (Sharon and most of the people) quilts taught by excellent teachers. Sewing machines were provided. We needed to bring the sewing supplies. Pre-cut kits are sold for each quilt although Sharon and I cut our own fabric for a brighter quilt this time.

Sewing days are every day except during the time of the excursion. On our day long excursion, we went to an Amish grocery where they make noodles. Then onto Teaberry Basket Shop. Here they make baskets out of layers of wood, not woven. We were full after a scrumptious lunch at an Amish farm. We saw some of the gardens and murals that the county presents each year although barn quilts might take over before long. The quilt shop was okay. Our guide on the bus was from the area and kept us entertained by telling lots of fascinating things about the Amish and Mennonites.

The real shopping was located close to the hotel. We were happy we drove and didn't have to think about what would fit in a suitcase! It was a great adventure I hope others will enjoy too.

Quilt Shop Review

Olive Grace Studios, A Quilt Shop on a Farm

The guilt shop is in a schoolhouse on the parents of Kori Turner-Goodhart farm in Cortland, Ohio. Walking up flagstones shaped like puzzle pieces to this very small shop was interesting. The guilt shop is chock full of fabrics and samples. Many of the samples have sayings on them such as "Make your own luck", "You make ordinary days extraordinary" "Home is where you are", and "Keep going, you're worth it". Kori's books were published by the now extinct Martingale, so she bought the rights to her patterns and sells them individually and in her books. Her fabric is modern but not too modern. One of her lines has little animals with sayings written on their bodies. I had to buy this one. Olive Grace Studios is open a few days a week and one weekend a month and we lucked out on it being the weekend we were driving by. It was well worth the visit and I'll be checking out the website (www.olivegracestudios.com) for another fabric from her line.
