Here is a recipe for a tasty coffee flavored punch from Carolyn Thompson. Enjoy!

COFFEE PUNCH

1 c. instant coffee3 quarts boiling water

½ c. chocolate syrup 2 Tbsp. rum flavoring

2 Tbsp. rum flavoring

MAKE YOURSELF A QUILT REPAIR KIT

Quilting Tip from KATY SANCHEZ:

"When I finish a new quilt I take several pieces of the leftover scraps, at least a few inches of each fabric, and I baste them together in a square or rectangle small enough to fit behind the quilt label. I place them under the quilt label and then hand stitch the label in place. If the quilt becomes torn and needs repair at some later date, the fabrics are there to repair it. They will have

been washed with the quilt each time it was washed and will be as faded as the quilt, so the repair will not be so obvious. I have had several children's quilts I have made over the years need repair and this makes it easy to find the coordinating scraps."



ANNIE'S CHOICE (12" Block)

Cut eight 4" squares



Cut eight 4" squares

- 1. Sew HSTs from the blue & gray squares. Trim to 3½."
- 2. Assemble these HSTs into a 12" block, using the illustration for placement.

Foundation Piecing: Assembling a Block by sewing pieces to a foundation of Muslin or plain

fabric, also for adding strength and stability to delicate or stretchy fabrics.

MINI BLOCK

JANUARY: BLOCK 5 (6" finished)

CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS

Dark: cut four 1½" x 2½" rectangles, cut four 1½" squares & two 2" squares

Medium: cut four 1½" x 2½" rectangles, cut four 1½" squares & two 2" squares

Light: cut four 1½" squares & four 2" squares

SEWING INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Make HST with the 2" squares (four dark with light & four medium with light). Trim to 1½."
- 2. Sew block together using the illustration for placement.

QUILT CHALLENGE 2012

Your challenge is to make not one, but two complementary quilts. Technique, color, fabric are all up to you. The two quilts should in some way complement each other, in color, design, technique, whatever your imagination envisions. Both quilts could be an appropriate size for a Priority Alzheimer's quilt (9" x 12," no exceptions). Both quilts do not have to be the same size.

Rule (there is only one):

Quilters must submit 2 quilts that are no larger than 12" x 18" inches. We will measure and we will have no mercy. Please pin your two quilts to a single piece of muslin for display (your name on the back of the muslin).

QUILT ODYSSEY ENTRY

The quilt contest entry form is now available for the 2012 Quilt Odyssey show in Hershey, July 26 - 30. You can download the form at https://server7.pacecomputing.com/quiltodysseycom/www/graphics/file/Contest-Online-Entry-Form.pdf.

A scrap piece of batting will pick up loose threads off your sewing room floor, quick as a jiffy.

Scratchier type batting works best.

Awards (each pair of quilts will be eligible for only one prize)

- First Finished (show it to a committee member)
- Participation (randomly drawn from all entries)

Quilts can win only one of the following awards:

- · Best embellishment
- · Best interpretation of the theme
- Viewer's Choice (we will award the top three, in no particular order)
- Judge's Choice (each committee member will choose a favorite and award her own prize to that quilter)
